SUBJECT: UNC Nursing Exam Results for 2006 and
Nursing Enrollment and Degrees Conferred Report

UNC Board of Governors' Policy and Annual Reporting Requirements

In May 1990, the University of North Carolina Board of Governors adopted the following policy and performance standards for UNC nursing programs:

A requirement that the president will consider, jointly with the Chancellor, an evaluation of the leadership, faculty, admissions policies and the curriculum of any program whose graduates do not achieve for two consecutive years an annual passing rate of 85% for first-time writers, and, a requirement that the president will ask the Board to initiate program termination procedures for any program having a first-time passing rate of less than 75% for two consecutive years.

This report on enrollment and licensure for the UNC nursing programs is prepared annually in accord with this Board policy. The UNC nursing students who took the NCLEX-RN exam for the first time in 2006 passed at an average rate of 92%. Four UNC campuses had passing rates above 95% (ECU, UNC-CH, UNCC and UNCW). Six of the nine campuses with graduates of prelicensure programs were at or above the Board standard for passing of 85%.

Two campuses have fallen below 85% passing rate for two consecutive years (NCA&T, and NCCU) and thus are below the BOG two-year standard. North Carolina A&T State University has fallen below the BOG's 85% standard for seven consecutive years while North Carolina Central University has been below the BOG's 85% standard for five consecutive years. WSSU fell below 85% in 2006 but not for two consecutive years.

The Board of Nursing maintains a required passing rate of 75%. NCA&T has fallen below that standard for two consecutive years. NCA&T's status with the Board of Nursing is on Warning

Response to 2006 Committee Report

For the 2005 results, NCA&T had a pass rate of 69% and NCCU had a pass rate of 65%. UNCC had a pass rate of 77%. In accord with past practice, a Nursing Review Team composed of current or former nursing deans from out of state was formed to visit NCA&T and NCCU. UNCC was requested to commission their own external review.

University of North Carolina at Charlotte

UNCC commissioned a team composed of Dean Alexia Green and Dr. Patricia Allen from the School of Nursing at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. The report identifies the strengths of the program and makes a series of recommendations for improvements. UNCC has prepared a response that appears to be reasonable to achieve improved performance on the NCLEX Exam. UNCC dramatically improved their NCLEX pass rate from 77% in 2005 to 97% in 2006.

North Carolina Central University

General Administration formed a national team of nursing deans to visit both NCA&T and NCCU. The team was composed of Dr. Cynthia Capers (chair) who is a former dean of nursing at the University of Toledo, Dr. Marilyn Rothert former dean of nursing at Michigan State University, and Dean Richard Benjamin from Old Dominion University.

NCCU made significant improvement in their NCLEX pass rate yet fell just below the BOG standard. NCCU went from 65% in 2005 to 82% in 2006. The review team judged that NCCU had taken the right steps to improve student performance but they need to make sure that the changes are institutionalized. The Review Team had a number of recommendations for improving the program. The Planning Committee approved a requirement that NCCU program be reduced by 15% each year that it was below the 85% standard. Based on informal information given to the Review Team that visited NCCU that Central would achieve an 85% rate, the Review Team recommended the 15% reduction requirement be lifted, but once the official score of 82% was reported the Team rescinded that recommendation.

North Carolina A&T State University

NCA&T made no improvement in 2006 over 2005 remaining at 69% a level below both BOG and Board of Nursing expectations. While the Nursing Review Team found some positives, they painted a picture of a program that had many problems and was far from where it should be in many areas. Given the number of years the program has been below acceptable levels for the NCLEX passing rate, Harold Martin and Alan Mabe met with the Chancellor and the Provost of NCA&T on February 8, 2007 to review the report and their response and to indicate the seriousness of the situation in light of the fact that the Board of Nursing had placed the program on Warning. The Review Team also recommended that the size of the

program be reduced by 15% each year that it fails to meet the BOG standard of 85% passing rate.

Nursing Programs

North Carolina has 65 nursing programs that train Registered Nurses. This includes 11 UNC baccalaureate programs (with new prelicensure programs at FSU and UNCP started in 2005), 44 associate degree programs offered by the North Carolina Community College System; 4 private baccalaureate programs, 3 independent ADN and 3 hospital-based diploma programs. According to the North Carolina Board of Nursing, the total number of students taking the exam from UNC programs increased from 830 in 2005 to 861 in 2006.

UNC Nursing Enrollment

The baccalaureate-nursing enrollment increased from 2,571 students in fall 2004 to 2,774 in fall 2005. Only upper-division majors are included in the data. Campuses have an additional approximately 1,000 lower division students taking nursing courses and planning to be majors. UNC nursing schools and departments currently offer RN to BSN distance learning programs at sites throughout the state. Some nursing courses are also offered via the internet and through interactive video. The number of students enrolled in master's programs increased from 923 to 1,027 a sizable increase. The number of nursing students enrolled in a doctoral program reached a new high of 88 (57 at UNC-Chapel Hill and 19 at East Carolina, and 12 at UNCG which opened its new doctoral program in the fall of 2005). UNC graduate programs prepare advanced practice practitioners, nursing specialists, nursing scientists, health administrators and nursing faculty for the UNC and community college programs. Overall enrollment in UNC nursing programs increased by over 9% for fall 2005.

UNC Nursing Degrees Conferred

Over the past ten years, the UNC nursing programs have been responsive to the needs of the state by expanding offerings and increasing capacity as much as possible in programs that have clinical requirements and mandated faculty/student ratios for licensure approval and accreditation. Since 1990 baccalaureate and masters degree production more than doubled. In this decade there has been a slight decline in baccalaureate degrees awarded but that has now turned around. For 2005-06 there were 1,269 baccalaureate degrees, 295 master's degrees and 10 doctorates awarded. The percentage increases over 2004-05 were 15%, 11% and 42%. The masters and doctorates will contribute to easing the shortage of faculty for nursing programs. The significant increase in enrollment should lead to further increases in graduates in future years.

Expanding Nursing Education in UNC.

The North Carolina Institute of Medicine issued its report on Nursing, *Task Force on the North Carolina Nursing Workforce Report* in May 2004. The Board established a Committee on the Future of Nursing which made its report to the

Board in November 2004. Both reports document the need for increasing the number of nurses in North Carolina and increasing the educational level of nurses. UNC campuses are well along in developing enrollment expansion plans to achieve the ambitious goals approved by the Board of Governors to increase the production of nurses at every level.
