Situation: Presentation of the annual Retention & Graduation Report.

Background: Information is presented regarding important measures of student success including First-time Full-time freshmen's second year retention, four-, five-, and six-year graduation rates, and graduation rates for transfer students from NCCCS with an associate's degree. Additionally, utilizing different data sets, UNC-GA provides analysis regarding student and academic success measures outside of the traditional measures of retention and graduation, including evaluations of degree efficiency and attempted hours to degree.

Assessment: UNC institutions exceed the national average in retention, four-year, five-year, and six-year graduation rates. Three of these four measures increased over the 2012-13 academic year, with only the five-year graduation rate experiencing a slight decrease.

Executive Summary

Measuring rates of student retention and graduation are important indicators of success at institutions of higher education. Many of these metrics reflect definitions developed by the US Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). These commonly used four- and six-year graduation rates exclusively refer to the degree completion of first-time, full-time (FTFT) freshmen cohorts who begin college in the fall semester. Many students attending University of North Carolina (UNC) institutions, such as transfer and part-time students, are not included in these IPEDS cohorts and their exclusion represents a significant number of students. This report presents retention and graduation data using a variety of metrics to present a fuller picture of student success across the UNC system.

Highlights for the UNC system during 2013-14 include:

- All UNC institutions exceeded national averages in retention and graduation rates. This is true for students remaining at their original UNC institution and for those that were retained at or graduated from another UNC institution.
 - The Fall 2013 IPEDS freshman-to-sophomore retention rate is 84.3% (+1.0 annual increase).
 - The 2013-14 IPEDS four-year graduation rate is 41.2% (+1.6 annual increase).
 - The 2013-14 IPEDS five-year graduation rate is 58.4% (-0.3% annual decrease).
 - The 2013-14 IPEDS six-year graduation rate is 63.1% (+1.9 annual increase).
- UNC also employs alternative measures to examine student success.
 - Using the Voluntary System of Accountability success measure, all UNC campuses saw significant success in retaining and graduating students.
 - Many students who transfer into the UNC system with an Associate of Arts or Science graduate within 3 years, with over 73% obtaining their bachelor's degree in four years or less.
 - The degree efficiency measure evaluates degree production relative to the average undergraduate full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment. Across UNC, the number of bachelor's degrees per 100 FTE undergraduates is 21.0, a slight increase over the previous year (+0.2).
 - The average attempted hours to degree represents the total number of credits in which both the student and the State of North Carolina has invested. The average attempted hours to degree for 2013-14 is 140.1, which is consistent with the prior year.
- The UNC Graduating Senior Survey from Spring 2013 reports "Personal Reasons" (26.3%) as the most frequent cause for extending time to degree.

Introduction

Commonly used measures of student success rates utilize indicators from the US Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) for first-time, full-time (FTFT) freshmen. Their widespread use enables institutions to benchmark student achievement against national trends and peer institutions.¹ In spite of the frequent use of IPEDS data, their definitions of student cohorts exclude transfer and part-time students, **which are slightly more than one-third (33.9%) of all 2014 UNC undergraduates**. Despite the continued importance of these traditional retention and graduation rates, the exclusion of one-third of all UNC students necessitate that UNC General Administration (UNC-GA) report alternative measures of success to the BOG and public.

Along with the IPEDS measures, UNC-GA uses four additional metrics to review student success. First, a growing number of students transfer to UNC from community colleges and to capture transfer student achievement, we report the graduation rates for students transferring to UNC from the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS). Second, many students move among institutions during their postsecondary career and to understand the complexities surrounding broader inter-institutional and inter-state transfers, results are shared from the publicly available Voluntary System of Accountability (VSA).² Third, UNC-GA evaluates institutional degree efficiency, which looks at degree production relative to the average undergraduate full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment. Fourth, UNC-GA reviews the average attempted hours to degree, which represents the total number of credits in which both the student and the State of North Carolina has invested.

The body of this report focuses on system-level graduation and retention rates with campus-level and corresponding peer benchmarks provided in Appendix A.³ As is customary with indicators that track educational performance over time, these measures group students into cohorts based on their matriculation into the university (for retention and graduation rates). Where possible, corresponding national rates are reported as well. In nearly all measures, UNC surpasses the national rates.⁴

Retention Rates

Over the past ten years, the UNC system has continuously improved its IPEDS freshman-to-sophomore retention rate. In Fall 2004, 81.3% of the FTFT freshmen returned to their original institution the following year, while 84.3% of students beginning

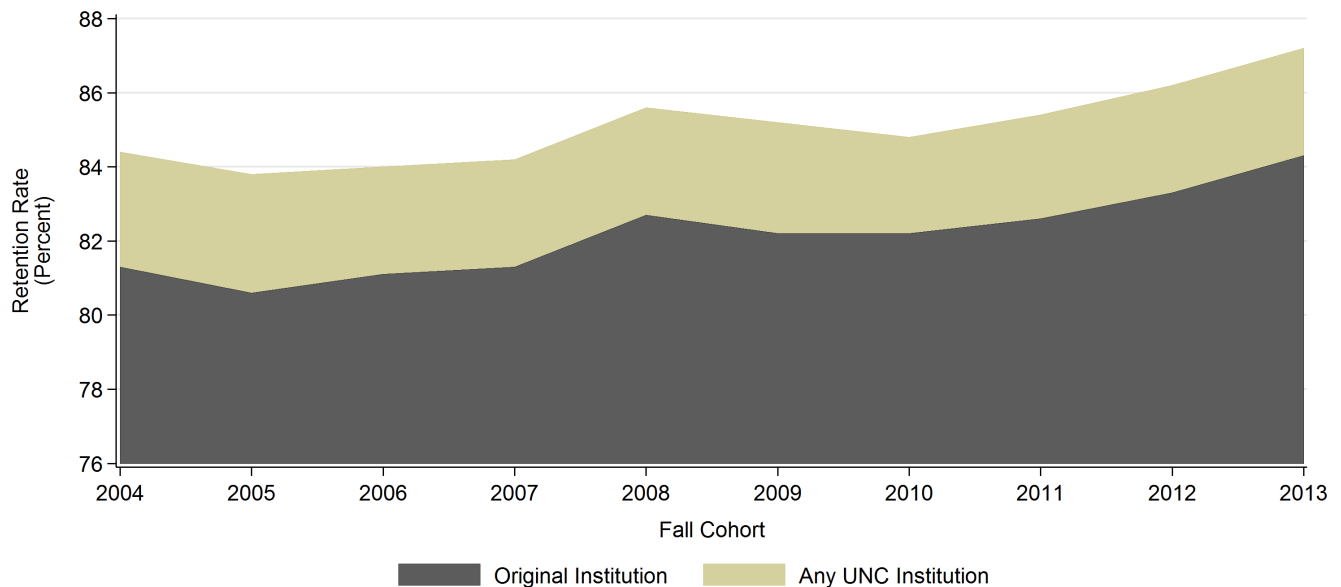

in Fall 2013 returned in Fall 2014, a 3.0% increase. Broadening the analysis to include students returning to any of the UNC institutions, 87.2% of FTFT freshmen who entered in Fall 2013 returned to the system in Fall 2014 (compared to 84.4% of Fall 2004 FTFT freshmen returning to any UNC institution in Fall 2005).

Figure 1: *Retention Rates of UNC First-Time, Full-Time Freshmen, Fall 2004 through Fall 2013 Cohorts*

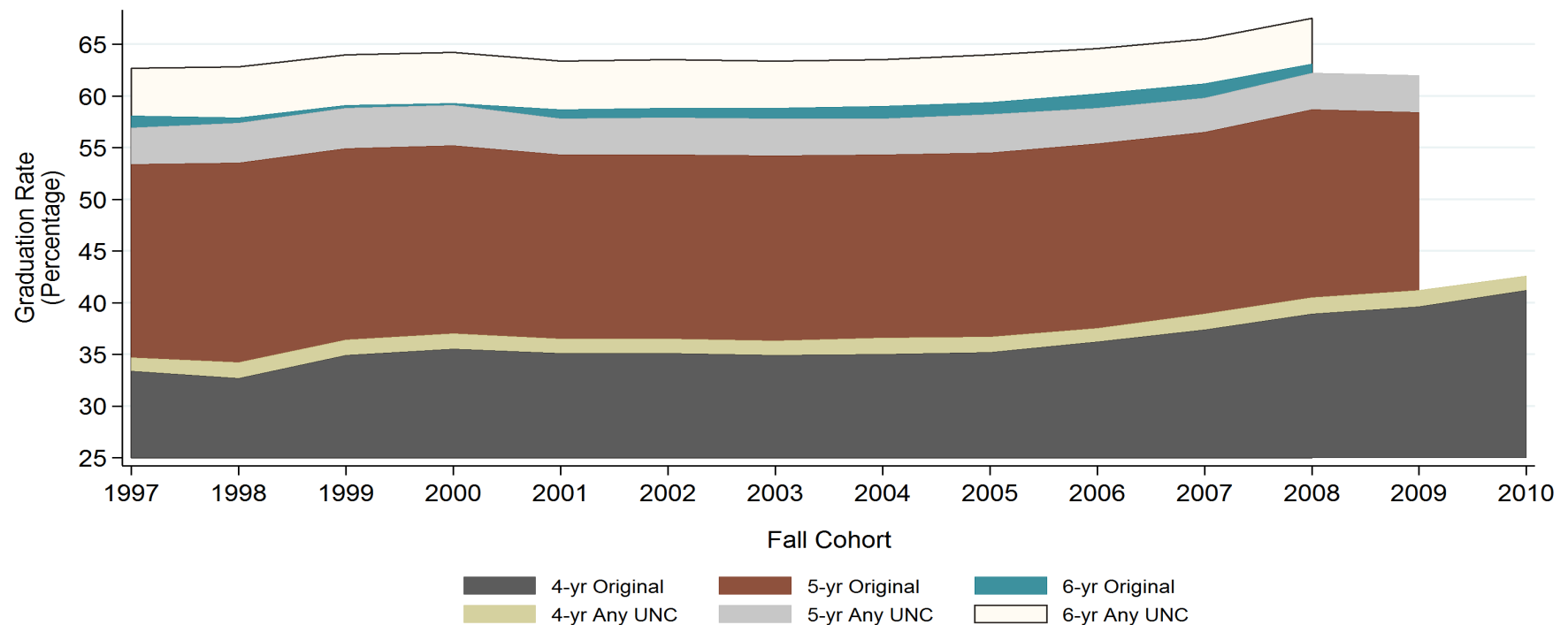

Four-, Five-, and Six-Year Graduation Rates

Tracking the graduation rate of FTFT cohorts over time yields further understanding of the progress made on degree attainment. UNC data shows that a significant percentage of students who do not graduate in four years finish their degree within five years of matriculation (58.4%). An additional 4.7% of FTFT freshmen graduate within six years of matriculating, which produces a six-year graduation rate at the students' original UNC institutions of 63.1%. For students that begin at one UNC institution and finish at another UNC institution, the six-year graduation rate is 67.5%. See Figure 2 for additional details on the four-, five-, and six-year graduation rates from the FTFT freshmen cohort of 1997 to the class beginning in Fall 2010.

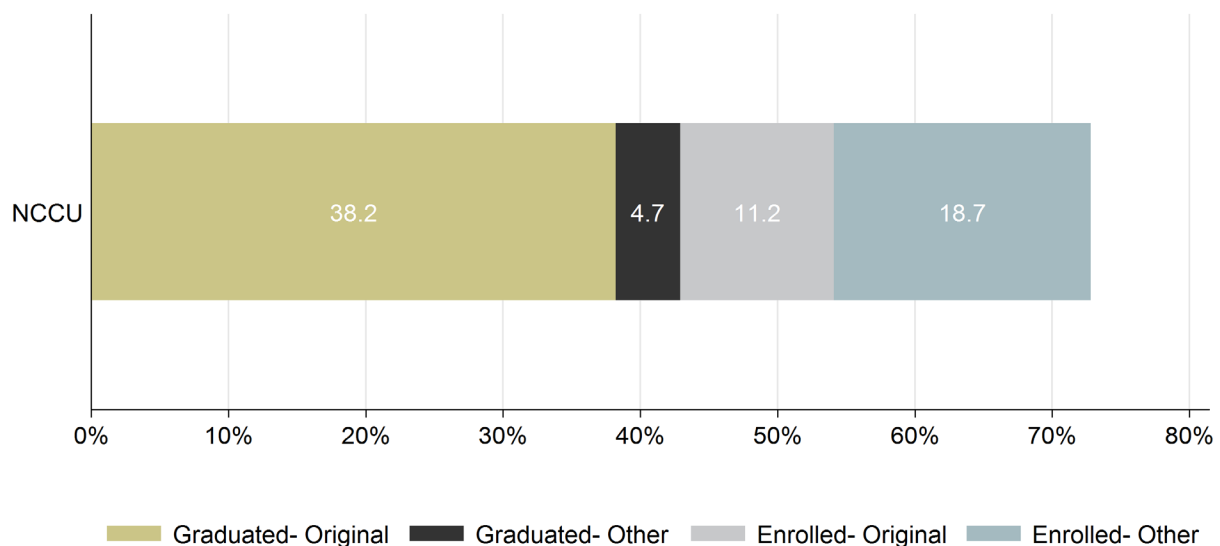
Alternative Measures of Success

Student Success from the Voluntary System of Accountability

The Voluntary System of Accountability (VSA) supplements traditional IPEDS measures of retention and graduation by expanding data to reflect graduation at any institution and includes students who remain enrolled. Importantly, the VSA uses enrollment and graduation across all *participating* universities, representing over 70% of the bachelor's degrees awarded in the US. As directed by *Our Time, Our Future*, all campuses regularly report campus data to increase the visibility of student and academic success measures.

For example, using the traditional methodology as reported on the VSA website, NCCU has a six-year graduation rate of 38.2% for all students that matriculated in Fall 2007 (see Figure 3). When accounting for all other institutions nationally, the graduation rate increases to 42.9%. Additionally, data show that another 29.9% are still enrolled and seeking a degree at NCCU or another institution. These numbers together (graduated and still enrolled) constitute the VSA measure for student success, which for NCCU is 72.8%: a 34.6% increase over the traditional IPEDS six-year graduation rate.

- Using the VSA student success measure, the campuses with the largest improvements over the traditional IPEDS success measures are: NCCU (34.6%), UNCP (32.5%), FSU (28.7%), UNCG (26.8%), and UNCC (26.6%).

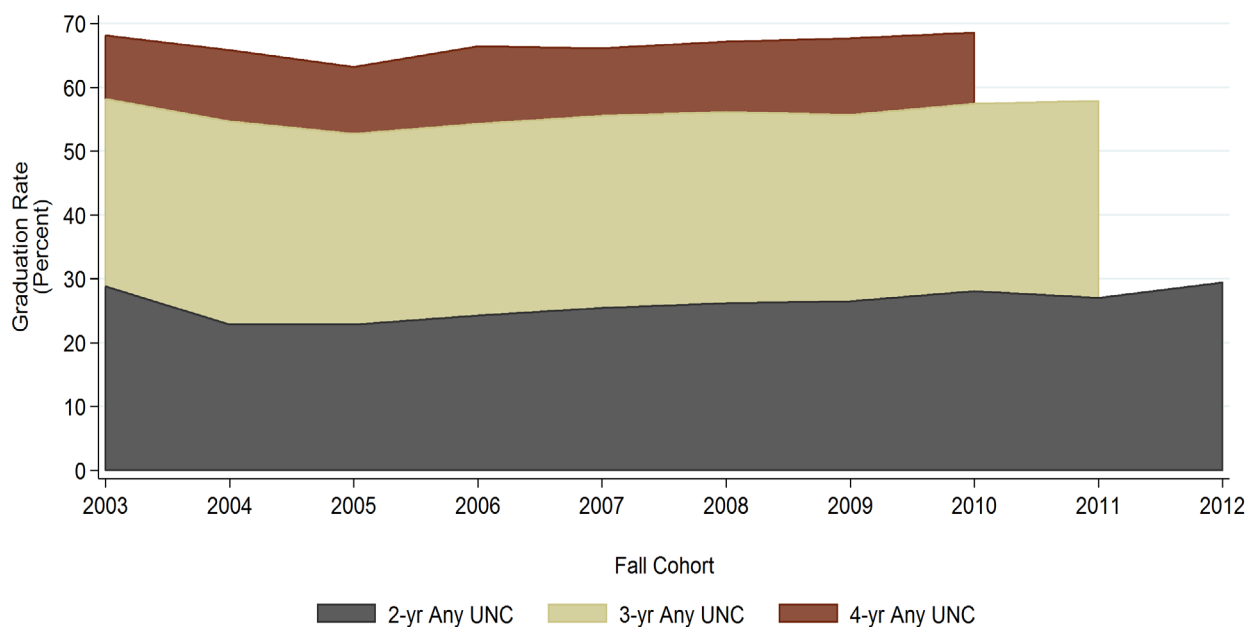
Two-, Three-, and Four-Year Graduation Rates of NCCCS Transfers

As noted previously, the traditional IPEDS graduation rates do not include transfer students; a population critical to UNC's strategic plan, *Our Time, Our Future*. Figure 4 provides the graduation rates for students who come to UNC institutions with an Associate of Arts or Science (AA or AS) from an NCCCS institution. Two details distinguish the graduation rates:

1. The two-, three-, and four-year graduation rates for NCCCS transfer students are similar to IPEDS' FTFT freshmen four-, five-, and six-year rates.
2. UNC data shows that after transferring, few students move among UNC campuses. Consequently, graduation data is only reported from the "any UNC institution" category.

As illustrated by Figure 4, many of the students who transfer with an AA or AS degree graduate within 3 years, with over 73% obtaining a bachelor's degree in four years or less. A more detailed report on transfer students will be presented to the BOG later this year.

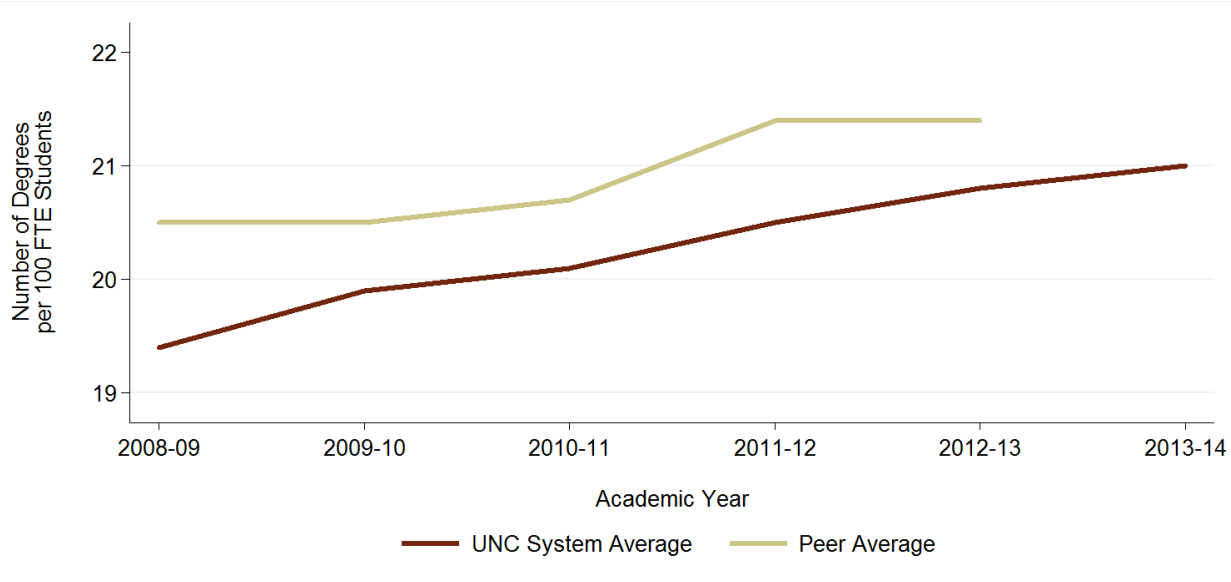

Degree Efficiency

When reviewing graduation rates, another tool used to evaluate the effectiveness of degree programs and degree production is the number of bachelor's degrees awarded per 100 full-time equivalent (FTE) undergraduates. This measure evaluates degree production in a given academic year relative to the average number of undergraduate FTE. In contrast to IPEDS' six-year graduation rates, this measure captures outcomes of undergraduate students regardless of how or when they entered during an academic year (not just the traditional fall semester cohorts). Across the UNC system in 2013-14, the number of bachelors degrees per 100 FTE undergraduates was 21.0. Appendix B provides data for each campus and the average for their peer institutions over the last five years, during which time only two institutions saw decreases in this measure. Figure 5 illustrates the UNC system average over the last five years for this measure.

Attempted Hours to Degree

As outlined in the UNC strategic plan, *Our Time, Our Future*, UNC measures attempted hours to degree for undergraduate degree recipients. The attempted hours to degree measure evaluates the total number of hours attempted by undergraduates en route to their baccalaureate degree. The metric includes both accepted transfer credits for transfer students and all credits attempted at the graduates' UNC institution. "Attempted hours" is different than "completed/earned hours;" attempted hours include courses in which students fail, drop, or withdraw and therefore represent the total number of credits in which the student and the State of North Carolina have invested.⁶ As

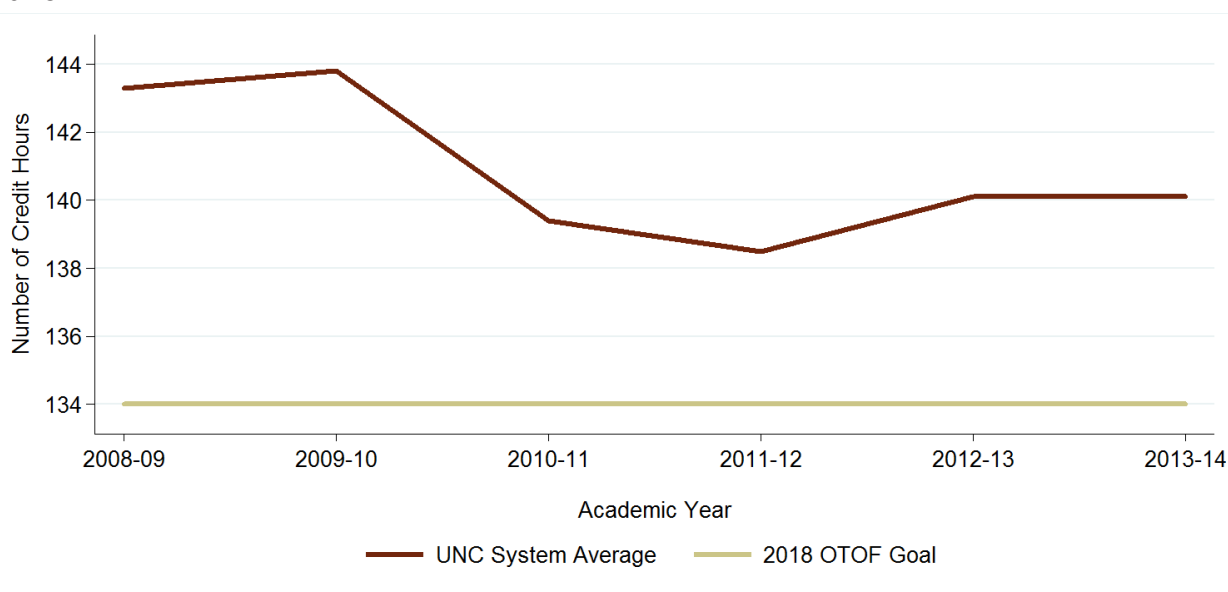

attempted hours are reduced, there is significant cost avoidance for all stakeholders. Most degree programs are 120 credit hours (with notable exceptions for engineering and other science majors who frequently require up to 128 hours to graduate).

This metric indicates how efficiently students are progressing towards their degree and helps answer important questions such as whether students are taking the correct courses, whether students are passing their courses, and for transfer students, whether the courses completed at community colleges count toward degree requirements. This metric is a proxy for understanding how well UNC is doing in advising students, enrolling students in required courses, and to some extent, the success of the UNC/NCCCS articulation agreement.

In 2013-14, the average attempted hours to degree across all institutions was 140.1. Appendix C provides institution-level data and the UNC system average for total attempted hours to degree for the last five academic years. Figure 6 shows the UNC average for attempted hours to degree over the last five years and highlights the System's goal of 134 attempted hours to degree as detailed in *Our Time, Our Future*.

Self-Reported Reasons for Delayed Graduation

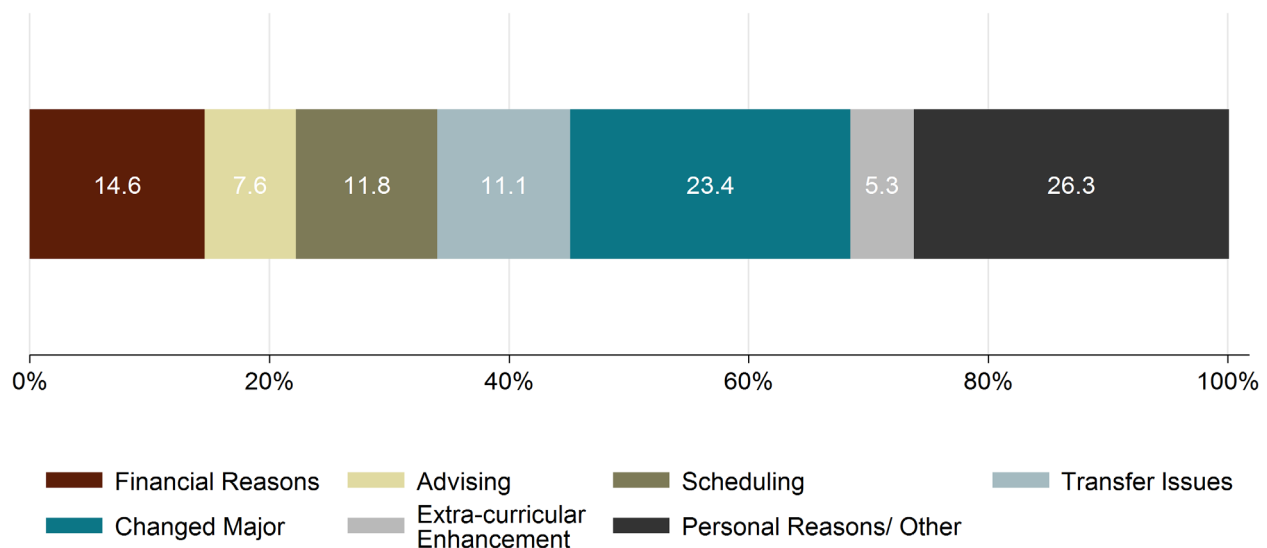
Every three years, UNC-GA works closely with campuses to facilitate a system-wide survey of graduating seniors.⁷ The most recent survey of seniors was completed in Spring 2013 and graduating seniors were asked a variety of questions about their undergraduate experience. One particular question of interest asked whether or not they

took more than four years to graduate and, if so, their reasons for it. Student respondents indicated “Personal Reasons” as the most frequent cause for extending their time-to-degree.⁸ While institutional or BOG policies cannot address the “Personal Reasons” for extending a student’s time in school, there are other areas mentioned by the student respondents that are being addressed at a variety of policy and practical levels.

Figure 7 highlights the categories of student responses for taking longer than four years to graduate. Through the UNC five-year strategic plan and the policy efforts of the BOG, UNC is directly addressing areas such as Financial Reasons, Advising, Scheduling, and Transfer Issues. With regards to financial considerations prolonging a student’s time-to-degree, North Carolina’s constitutional commitment to maintaining affordable tuition for its citizens reflects the state’s historical leadership in this policy arena. Proposals to improve academic advising and the availability of courses to students are included in *Our Time, Our Future* as well.
