DRAFT 2008 Prospective Teacher Scholars Focused Growth Pilot Report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee

ABSTRACT

The University of North Carolina was directed in 2002 to establish a pilot program at three of the Focused Growth campuses to recruit new non-resident students, who will be eligible to receive resident tuition rates, if they agree to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors is required to report annually to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

The participating campuses are Elizabeth City State University (ECSU), University of North Carolina at Pembroke (UNC-P), and Western Carolina University (WCU). Each campus is permitted to have a total of 20 students in the program at any given time. Currently, there are a total of forty-three students enrolled at a cost of \$378,230 for tuition waivers. Funding to support the difference in resident and non-resident tuition is allocated from the campuses focused growth funds. In the fifth year of the pilot, eight students have matriculated through the program and graduated. Seven of the eight graduates are currently teaching in a North Carolina public school. Over the five years this pilot has been in existence, students have been recruited from seventeen states.

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Attracting and retaining high quality teachers for North Carolina's public schools is of critical importance. The University of North Carolina's deep, urgent commitment to ensuring a sufficient supply of high quality teachers for the state's public school classrooms is evidenced in our fifteen teacher education programs' efforts to recruit, prepare, license, and further develop the states' teacher workforce. One promising recruitment model that is being piloted on three campuses is the Prospective Teacher Scholars Focused Growth Pilot program. This unique pilot is one of the many ways the University is responding to the state's teacher supply-demand gap.

The pilot program was established in 2003-04 on three of the University of North Carolina's focused growth campuses; Elizabeth City State University (ECSU), UNC Pembroke (UNC-P), and Western Carolina University (WCU). The focused growth pilot program, entitled the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program, allows these campuses to recruit non-resident students to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Participating students must sign a promissory note with the institution agreeing to teach an equal number of years in North Carolina. If the student later decides not to pursue teacher education or does not teach in North Carolina, the student will be charged the difference between resident and non-resident tuition, plus interest. Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors developed guidelines and regulations for the pilot programs and reported to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee Chairs on November 12, 2002.

This report provides information on the progress and costs of the pilot program on each of the three participating campuses to date. The data in Tables 1-4 presents specific campus information about the pilot, as well as collective totals for the three participating focused growth campuses. One scholar to date from the 2003-04 cohort, graduated in December 2006 of this year from WCU. Total tuition waiver costs to date are \$1,039,014. Legislation enacting this pilot is provided in Attachment 1. The UNC Board of Governors' guidelines and regulations, 800.4.1, adopted on November 8, 2002 are provided in Attachment 2.

Table 1 presents data for 2003-04. In the first year of the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program, fifteen scholars were enrolled on the three campuses participating in this focused growth pilot: five at ECSU, two at UNC-P, and eight at WCU. The 2003-04 tuition waiver costs for the fifteen newly enrolled students was \$134,936. The cost by campus for the first year of the pilot was \$41,320 at ECSU, \$18,728 at UNC-P, and \$74,888 at WCU.

Table 2 provides data for 2004-05, the second year of the pilot. In this year, thirteen of the fifteen scholars returned and the campuses collectively enrolled an additional fourteen new scholars. Seven of the fourteen new scholars and five returning enrolled at ECSU, three new and one returning scholar enrolled at UNC-P, and four new and seven

returning scholars enrolled at WCU. A total of twenty-seven scholars were enrolled in the program in the 2004-05 academic year, increasing the tuition waiver costs for the program in year two to \$227,468. The cost by campus for the second year of the pilot was \$100,068 at ECSU, \$33,040 at UNC-P, and \$94,360 at WCU.

Data in Table 3 provides information for the 2005-06 academic year, including the total tuition waiver costs for the three years the pilot program had been in existence. In 2005-06, the third year of the pilot program, twenty-four of the prior years' twenty-seven scholars returned and the campuses collectively enrolled an additional eleven new scholars.

Eleven of the twentyfour returning scholars and five new scholars enrolled in the fall semester at ECSU, two returning and one new scholar enrolled at UNC-P, and eleven returning and five new

scholars enrolled at WCU (one scholar dropped out after fall 2005, leaving fifteen enrolled). A total of thirty-four scholars were enrolled in the program in 2005-06, increasing the tuition waiver costs for the program in year three to \$289,679. The cost by campus for year three of the pilot was \$129,255 at ECSU, \$28,320 at UNC-P, and \$132,104 at WCU. Total tuition waiver costs for the third year of the pilot was \$666,239; \$270,643 at ECSU, \$84,808 at UNC-P, and \$310,788 at WCU.

Data from the fourth year of the pilot is provided in Table 4. In 2006-07, twenty-eight of the prior years' thirty-four scholars returned. An additional fourteen new scholars were enrolled across the pilot campuses for a total of forty-one enrolled scholars; eighteen at ECSU, seven at UNC-P, and sixteen at WCU. The total tuition

waiver costs for 2006-07 is \$373,042; \$150,102 at ECSU, \$64,820 at UNC-P, and \$158,120 at WCU. The first student graduate from the 2003-04 cohort matriculated in December 2006 from WCU.

Table 5 presents data for 2007-08. In the fifth year of the program, twenty-two new scholars were enrolled; seven at ECSU, eleven at UNC-P, and four at WCU. Twenty-three of the prior years' scholars returned for a total of forty –three

scholars enrolled in 2007-08; fourteen at ECSU, fifteen at UNC-P, and fourteen at WCU. The total 2007-08 tuition waiver cost is \$378,230. Tuition cost by campus for this year is \$124,334 at ECSU, \$138,900 at UNC-P, and \$114,996 at WCU.

As of 2006-07, eight Prospective Teacher Scholars have graduated; one in 2005-06 and seven in 2006-07. Of these graduates, seven are currently teaching in a North Carolina public school. One of the six scholar graduates at WCU is pursuing a master's degree and is currently enrolled on that campus in a graduate program of study. The total number of scholar graduates by campus and by academic year is listed in table 6.

In summary, tuition waiver costs expended by the three participating focused growth campuses to date for the five years the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program has been in existence is \$1,430,051; \$540,909 at ECSU, \$288,582 at UNC-P, and \$600,560 at WCU. Students have been recruited from seventeen states; CA, CT, FL, GA, IA, KS, MA, MD, MI, MN, NJ, NY, OH, PA, SC, TN, and VA. Twenty-six scholars have come from the North Carolina border states of South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia. Seven of the eight scholar graduates are currently teaching in a North Carolina public school.

TECHNICAL NOTES:

Elizabeth City State University – In 2003-04 the difference of out-of-state and in-state tuition at ECSU was \$8,264, in 2004-05 the tuition differential was \$8,339 and in 2005-06 the differential remains the same. In 2005-06, two of the fifteen scholars that enrolled in the fall of 2005 have dropped out of the program, leaving thirteen enrolled in the spring 2006 semester. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at ECSU is \$8,339.

UNC Pembroke – In the 2003-04 year, UNC-P made fifteen offers and three accepted. In addition, one of the three was removed from the program because the student's father was retroactively charged the in-state tuition rate due to a military residency waiver. In 2003-04 the difference in out-of-state and in-state tuition at UNC-P was \$9,364. In the 2004-05 year, UNC-P made fourteen offers with three accepting, and one of two students returning from the prior year. One of the returning scholars from the 2003-04 year transferred to UNC Wilmington. In 2004-05 the tuition differential at UNC-P was \$9,440. The differential remains the same in 2005-06. For the 2006-07 year, two scholarships were offered with one accepting. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at UNC-P is \$9,260.

Western Carolina University – Costs in 2003-04 reflect tuition waivers for eight students (one student dropped out). In 2003-04 the difference in out-of-state and in-state tuition at WCU was \$9,361. Costs in 2004-05 reflect tuition waivers for five students (one student dropped out). In 2004-05 the tuition differential at WCU was \$9,436 and in 2005-06 the differential remains the same. In 2005-06, one of the sixteen scholars that enrolled in the fall of 2005 has dropped out of the program, leaving fifteen enrolled in the spring 2006 semester. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at WCU is \$9,583.

SENATE BILL 1115, SECTION 9.9 (2001)

FOCUSED GROWTH PILOT PROGRAM

SECTION 9.9. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina may allow Elizabeth City State University, the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, and Western Carolina University each to allocate up to one hundred seventy-eight thousand three hundred eighty dollars (\$178,380) of the funds allocated to them for focused enrollment growth for a maximum of 20 Prospective Teacher Scholars. These funds may be used to recruit new nonresident students to enter into agreements to: (i) pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and (ii) teach in a North Carolina public school or a school operated by the United States government in North Carolina for one year for each year that they receive this benefit. The Board of Governors shall establish guidelines and regulations for this pilot program, including methodology for determining its success in increasing the supply of qualified teachers for North Carolina public schools. The Board shall report its guidelines and regulations to guide these pilot programs to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by November 15, 2002. The Board shall report annually to the Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA POLICY MANUAL: 800.4.1

Adopted 11/08/02

PROSPECTIVE TEACHER SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The University of North Carolina has been directed to establish a pilot program at three of the Focused Growth campuses to recruit new nonresident students to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors is required to report guidelines and regulations for these pilot programs to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by November 15, 2002, and then report annually to the Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

The following policies are to be used for implementation of the Prospective Teacher Scholar programs at Elizabeth City State University, the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, and Western Carolina University.

- 1. The Prospective Teacher Scholar funds are to be used for non-resident students who make a commitment to pursue a degree in teacher education at one of the three constituent institutions, ECSU, UNCP, or WCU.
- 2. The Prospective Teacher Scholar program is a scholarship-loan program. Scholarship funds will be used to pay the difference between the cost of resident tuition and fees and non-resident tuition and fees. For each year the student receives the scholarship-loan, the student must teach full-time for an academic year in a North Carolina (K-12) public school or a school operated by the United States Government in North Carolina. The student will have a maximum of seven (7) years or two years time for each year of the scholarship (whichever is less) from the date of graduation to fulfill the payback agreement by teaching in a North Carolina public school.

3.

- a. Eligibility to participate in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program is limited to non-resident students who enter as a new freshman or as an undergraduate transfer student, and will be enrolled full-time each fall and spring semester, and make satisfactory progress toward a teaching degree.
- b. The student must maintain a satisfactory GPA and be in good standing with the university each year of study.

- c. The student must meet the criteria and be admitted to the Teacher Education program by the beginning of the Junior year.
- d. The student must graduate and be eligible for a license to teach in a North Carolina public school within six months after graduation.
- 4. Students participating in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program will not be included in the campus' cap of 18% freshmen non-resident students.
- 5. Any Prospective Teacher Scholar student who chooses to attend summer school classes will be eligible for the in-state resident rate for tuition and fees.
- 6. Each recipient of a Prospective Teacher Scholar scholarship-loan is required to sign a promissory note, along with a surety, agreeing that if the student does not fulfill the payback requirement to teach in a North Carolina public school (as described in #2), the student will be required to repay the campus the differential between the resident and non-resident tuition and fees for each year they do not fulfill the payback requirement. The student will also be required to pay the campus the cost as identified above plus 10% interest on the identified amount which begins to accrue from the date of graduation or the date the student transfers to another institution or the date the student is no longer enrolled full-time and full-term, whichever is earliest.
- 7. Any Prospective Teacher Scholar recipient who does not complete the teacher education program or who terminates the degree program will be subject to the repayment of the scholarship as described in item #6.
- 8. Awards may begin as early as the spring 2003 semester for new freshmen or new transfer students. Currently enrolled students are not eligible to participate in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program.
- 9. Students selected as Prospective Teacher Scholar recipients will be eligible for consideration for additional merit awards and non-state funded need-based financial aid.
- 10. The Prospective Teacher Scholar scholarship-loan must be considered as part of the student's financial aid package. When the total financial aid award exceeds financial need, the scholarship may not be reduced to prevent an over-award.
- 11. The campus shall forgive the repayment if it finds that it is impossible for a person to comply with the requirements of item #2 or item #6 because of the person's death or permanent disability. The campus may forgive the repayment if the President finds that a person could not comply with the requirements of item #2 or item #6 for extraordinary circumstances not within the person's control.

Overview of UNC Sponsored Program Activity, FY 2007

The University of North Carolina continues to excel in obtaining external funding in support of research. For the fourth consecutive year, the portfolio of new external funds tops \$1 billion. This year's funding level of \$1,054,513,496 demonstrates the quality of our faculty and the depth and breadth of their research interests, as we continue to realize gains in new funding in spite of flat and in some cases declining federal R&D funding.

Federal funding continues to dominate the research portfolio and accounts for approximately 68% of the total. The top three external sponsors were US DHHS National Institutes of Health, the U.S. Department of Education, which is up 96% over FY 2005, and the National Science Foundation. Overall, federal funding increased 8%.

The continued success of the system is no longer to two large universities. Seven campuses as well as the system office realized double digit increases in the monies awarded to them. Of special note is North Carolina Central University which saw grant funding increase 80% and its funding exceed \$23 million. In addition Winston Salem State University saw a near doubling of funding to \$14 million.

The awards of external funds generate significant economic returns for North Carolina and our communities, bringing hundreds of millions of dollars and thousands of jobs to the State. Research conducted by UNC campuses spawns new companies and technologies that are vital to the State's competitive advantage. It is estimated that for every \$1 million in research funding attracted to the state, approximately 39 jobs are created.

In a very competitive funding environment the breadth and scope of the research capabilities across our campuses continue to keep our awards going up.

Physical Education-Coaching Scholarship Loan This program was established by the 2005 NC General Assembly to provide scholarship-loans to students who are pursuing college degrees to become public school teachers and coaches or assistant coaches in the public schools of North Carolina. Recipients will enroll in a curriculum that advances skills in physical education and coaching and that instills a strong motivation not only to remain in the coaching professions but to provide leadership in the schools where they coach. Annual awards of \$4,000 per year are offered to eligible students enrolled full time.

Recipients will be required to repay the scholarshiploan through qualifying service to the State of North Carolina upon graduation; those who do not fulfill the service obligation must repay the scholarship-loan in cash with 10% interest rate. One year of service as a full time teacher cancels one year of funding support received. The program is administered by the North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority. North Carolina Teaching Fellows Program

The NC Teaching Fellows Program provides \$6,500 a year for four years of full-time undergraduate study leading to a degree in teacher education at a college or university with a Teaching Fellows Program. A maximum of 500 scholarships are awarded each year to current high school seniors.

At each of the selected institutions, unique enrichment programs have been designed specifically for Teaching Fellows. These programs include activities such as seminars, cultural events, faculty mentor programs, early field experiences, and study abroad programs. Emphasis is placed on leadership development skills and activities that will give Teaching Fellows a broad range of experiences beyond the required work.

Recipients must be accepted for admission to one of the following postsecondary institutions in North Carolina: Appalachian State University, Campbell University, East Carolina University, Elizabeth City State University, Elon University, Lenior-Rhyne College, Meredith College, North Carolina A&T State University, North Carolina Central University, North Carolina State University, Queens University, UNC Asheville, UNC Chapel Hill, UNC Charlotte, UNC Greensboro, UNC Pembroke, UNC Wilmington, and Western Carolina University. Applicants are screened by two committees, one from the applicant's local school district, and the other from the educational region in which the applicant lives. Candidates recommended by the selection committees are interviewed by the Regional Screening Committees. Financial need is not a selection criterion.

SUBJECT: Licensure of ECPI College of Technology to offer five new degree

programs in Raleigh, NC

The Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina is charged under North Carolina General Statute Section 116-15 with responsibility for licensing nonpublic educational institutions to conduct post-secondary degree activity in North Carolina. In November 2004, the Board of Governors approved revisions to the document, Rules and Standards: Licensing Nonpublic Institutions to Conduct Degree Activity in North Carolina. This document provides the guidelines for interpreting the standards, and the rules, regulations, and procedures under which the Board issues licenses to institutions to conduct post-secondary degree activity in North Carolina.

ECPI College of Technology applied for licensure to offer the following new degree programs at its campus in Raleigh, NC: Bachelor of Science degree in Computer & Information Science, Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice, Bachelor of Science degree in Electronics Engineering Technology, Associate of Science degree in Computer Electronics Engineering Technology, and Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice.

ECPI College of Technology is already licensed to offer the followed degree programs at its campus in Raleigh: Associate of Applied Science degree in Computer & Information Science (majors in Business Systems Administration, Criminal Justice Technology, Information Technology/Networking & Security Management, Information Technology/Web Design, Management Information Systems, Medical Administration); Associate of Applied Science degree in Computer Electronics Technology (major in Computer Electronics Engineering Technology); and Associate of Applied Science degree in Health Science (major in Medical Assisting).

Dr. Harry Williams reviewed the application and appointed a team of examiners to determine if ECPI College of Technology complied with the licensure standards outlined in Rules and Standards. On November 13, 2007, the team of examiners visited the ECPI campus in Raleigh. Following the site visit, the team of examiners

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issued its report with suggestions and recommendations, and a final recommendation to grant licensure to the proposed degree programs. Dr. Williams agrees with the team's review and recommendations. For more details on the recommendations and the proposed degree programs, please review the summary.

Thus, I recommend to the Committee on Educational Planning, Policies, and Program of the UNC Board of Governors that licensure be granted to ECPI College of Technology to offer the previously mentioned proposed degree programs at its campus in Raleigh, subject to annual reports and review at any time. After one year has elapsed, ECPI College of Technology in Raleigh will be reviewed to judge whether the institution continues to maintain standards for licensure.

SUMMARY OF VISIT OF TEAM OF EXAMINERS FOR ECPI COLLEGE OF TECHNOLOGY AT RALEIGH, NC

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

ECPI College of Technology was originally established in 1966 in the Commonwealth of Virginia. It is an independent, private college whose primary mission is to offer quality collegiate education in science and technology in a learner-centered environment. The College is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and it is authorized to award the Associate of Applied Science, the Associate of Science, and the Bachelor of Science degrees. ECPI College of Technology is headquartered in Virginia Beach, Virginia. The College has campuses located in North Carolina at Charlotte, Greensboro, and Raleigh. There are also campuses located in Virginia at Manassas, Newport News, and Virginia Beach. In South Carolina, there are campuses located in Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville.

THE APPLICATION AND SITE VISIT

On August 31, 2007, ECPI College of Technology submitted an application to General Administration to offer five new degree programs: Bachelor of Science degree in Computer & Information Science, Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice, Bachelor of Science degree in Electronics Engineering Technology, Associate of Science degree in Computer Electronics Engineering Technology, and Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice. The purpose of the application and documentation is to demonstrate that ECPI is in compliance with the fifteen standards contained in The University of North Carolina Board of Governors' *Rules and Standards: Licensing Nonpublic Institutions to Conduct Post-Secondary Degree Activity in North Carolina* for the proposed degree programs.

ECPI College of Technology campus in Raleigh is licensed to offer the Associate of Applied Science degree in Computer & Information Science (majors in Business Systems Administration, Criminal Justice Technology, Information Technology/Networking & Security Management, Information Technology/Web Design, Management Information Systems, Medical Administration); Associate of Applied Science degree in Computer Electronics Technology (major in Computer Electronics Engineering Technology); and Associate of Applied Science degree in Health Science (major in Medical Assisting). Though licensed, the A.A.S. degree in Computer & Information Science with majors in Business Systems Administration and Medical Administration, and the A.A.S. degree in Health Science with a major in Medical Assisting have not been implemented.

The application for the five new degree programs was evaluated by staff in General Administration. Shortly thereafter, a team of examiners was assembled, and they included Dr. Richard Neel (chair), Dean Emeritus, Belk College of Business Administration, and Professor of Economics Emeritus, The University of North Carolina at Charlotte; Dr. Joe N. Cagle, Chair, Criminal Justice and Paralegal Department, Gaston College, Dallas, North Carolina, and Attorney and Counselor at Law, Hickory, North Carolina; Dr. Eric Patterson, Assistant Professor of Computer Science, University of North Carolina at Wilmington; Mr. Charles J. Popovich, Head Librarian, Business Library, and Associate Professor, Ohio State University, Columbus,

Ohio; and Dr. Harry L. Williams, Interim Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, The University of North Carolina General Administration, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Ex Officio.

According to the *Rules and Standards*, an institution is subject to review of licensure by the Board, or its designee, prior to commencing new degree programs and at regular intervals thereafter. Thus, the team's task was to review the application and to participate in a site visit to determine if the institution demonstrated compliance with licensure standards for the proposed new programs. On November 13, 2007, the team of examiners visited ECPI College of Technology, in Raleigh, to review its compliance with the Standards for the proposed degree programs.

During the visit, the team of examiners met with numerous faculty, staff, and students at ECPI College of Technology at Raleigh. These meetings included John Olson, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Ronald J. Ballance, Vice President of Student Development Services, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Gregory A. Casey, Vice President for Business and Finance, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Rebecca Tabakin, Coordinator of Libraries, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Susan Wells, President, Raleigh Campus; Dr. J. Blair Jerome, Director of Education, Raleigh Campus; Eileen Kania, Librarian, Raleigh Campus; Carl Burnett, Department Chair, Criminal Justice, Raleigh Campus; Ife Alexander-Caines, Associate Dean for Criminal Justice, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Dr. Wael Ibrahim, Associate Dean for Electrical Engineering Technology, Virginia Beach, Virginia; Michael Taylor, Department Chair, Network Security, Raleigh Campus; David Atkins, Mathematics and Computer Information Science faculty; Lynn Erla Beegle, Computer Information Science faculty; Katherine Follett, Psychology faculty; Terry Gardner, Computer Electronics Engineering faculty; Tara Gilmore, Computer Information Science faculty; Marc Graustark, Computer Information Science faculty; William Harding, Computer Information Science faculty; Lamar Ray Harris, Computer Information Science faculty; Gloria Hicks, Communication faculty; William Howdeshell, Computer Information Science faculty; Steven Powell, Mathematics and Computer Information Science faculty; Alecia Smith, Criminal Justice faculty; Jenifer L. Wolkowski, English faculty; Jennifer Borden, student; Chasity Brown, student; Wesley East, student; Tamra Estes, student; Jon Huff, student; Michael Johnson, student; Eric Krebs, student; Jamie Schurer, student; Byron Scott, student; and Misty Tucker, student.

DEGREE PROGRAMS

The proposed associate degree programs consist of a minimum of 60 semester credit hours and require at least two academic years of full-time attendance or the equivalent. The College defines an academic year as a minimum of 30 weeks of instruction. Applicants to degree programs who possess deficiencies within a prescribed range in mathematics or writing will be required to successfully complete prerequisite courses (which do not receive college credit) in addition to the minimum of 60 semester credit hours normally required for graduation. An appropriate general education component at the college level is required for the proposed A.S. degree program. Once students are enrolled in the proposed Associate of Science degree transfer programs, they will be advised of the transfer requirements in North Carolina during student orientation. In addition, faculty advisors will make this information known to degree program students as part of the ongoing academic advising process.

The proposed Bachelor of Science degree programs require a minimum of 120 semester credit hours for degree completion and a minimum of 30 semester credit hours of general education courses. ECPI requires general education courses from the humanities/fine arts, the social/behavioral sciences, and the natural sciences/mathematics. Achievement of the general education competencies are evaluated annually by the Arts and Sciences Department Head, and evidence of their achievement is reported annually.

The already licensed associate degree programs offered by the Raleigh campus have been judged by past teams of examiners to provide an education of good quality. As ECPI College of Technology's Raleigh campus prepares to offer baccalaureate degree programs for the first time, the team of examiners encourages it to continue to provide an education of good quality.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Following the visit, the team submitted a *Preliminary Report* on December 28, 2007. The preliminary report of the team's findings was immediately forwarded to ECPI, for correction of factual errors or significant omissions.

Included in the report were nine recommendations and four suggestions. Recommendations must be addressed by the institution. Suggestions, however, are written for the institution's benefit, and do not need to be addressed by the institution; they reflect the professional judgment of team members, and do not signify that the institution is not in compliance with the *Rules and Standards*.

Several recommendations involved adequate office space and equipment. The team of examiners recommends that ECPI provide more faculty office space, additional telephones, and computers to accommodate current faculty and new faculty. The team also recommended that ECPI designate additional rooms at the Raleigh campus for private consultation between faculty and students.

Several recommendations involved access to library resources. The team recommended that ECPI use the NC Live icon on the Raleigh campus web page and acquire several data resources (i.e., Computers and Applied Science Complete, Compendex, INSPEC, ACM Digital, and IEEE Xplore) to support the new academic programs. Additionally, the team recommended that ECPI place the following icons on its Web page for student access: Sourcebook of Criminal Justice Statistics (http://www.albany.edu/sourcebook); Information Technology Association of America (http://www.ncga.state.nc.us).

Four significant recommendations referred to faculty credentials for the proposed degrees. The team of examiners recommends that ECPI utilize faculty in its proposed Associate of Science degree programs and proposed Bachelor of Science degree programs who hold at least a master's degree or the equivalent in the field of specialization in which they are teaching. Faculty teaching in the proposed AS degree programs must have a minimum of 18 graduate semester

hours in the master's degree and it must be in the discipline in which they are teaching, from a regionally accredited institution of higher education. A majority of the faculty teaching in the proposed BS degree programs must have satisfactorily completed work beyond the master's degree in an accredited graduate school, and at least 25 percent of the course hours in each major must be taught by faculty who hold the doctorate or other terminal degree in the field of specialization from a regionally accredited institution of higher education. A further recommendation is that ECPI utilize faculty to teach general education courses in the proposed AS and BS degree programs who hold a doctoral or a master's degree in the teaching discipline or a master's degree with a concentration in the teaching discipline (a minimum of 18 graduate semester hours in the teaching discipline). A final recommendation regarding faculty, included encouraging and support of faculty development opportunities, such as release time for research and funding for software, training, travel, and research, and that it develop, and publish in the Faculty & Staff Manual, a procedure for applying for faculty development support.

The last recommendation was for ECPI to provide General Administration with a copy of the 2007 Annual Report of the Assessment of Effectiveness Committee when it becomes available.

Upon review of the responses to the report, the team stated that the institution had satisfactorily addressed all of the concerns in the recommendations. The team of examiners recommends that the Raleigh campus of ECPI College of Technology be licensed to offer the following five new degree programs subject to compliance with all of the recommendations contained in the report: Bachelor of Science degree in Computer & Information Science; Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice; Bachelor of Science degree in Electronics Engineering Technology; Associate of Science degree in Computer Electronics Engineering Technology; and Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice.

If licensure is granted, a second recommendation is that a team of examiners review these five new degree programs at the Raleigh campus of ECPI College of Technology one year from the date of licensure for compliance with all of the recommendations contained in the report and for overall compliance with the licensure Standards.

Dr. Harry Williams agrees with the team's review and recommendations. Thus, General Administration recommends licensure for the abovementioned five proposed degree programs to be offered by ECPI College of Technology at its Raleigh campus subject to compliance with all the recommendations contained in the report issued by the team of examiners.

Request to Configure a New College at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte

The University of North Carolina at Charlotte seeks approval of their plan to establish a new College of Arts and Architecture. The college will include the current College of Architecture (reconfigured as a school in the new college) and the departments of Art and Art History, Music, and Dance and Theatre.

The arrival at this proposal was preceded by extensive collaboration on and off campus. The proposal has the unanimous support of the community arts leaders, the faculty of the four units, the College of Architecture Advisory Board, and the UNC Charlotte Faculty Council. It also fits with the UNC Tomorrow's focus on the arts, creativity, and the promotion of the arts and cultural enrichment in all regions of the state.

A supporting letter is provided by Provost Joan Lorden of UNCC.

General Administration recommends that the Educational Planning Committee recommend approval for establishing the new College of Arts and Architecture.

I am pleased to inform you that the Board of Trustees at its January 31, 2008, meeting unanimously approved a reconfiguration of several departments to create a College of Arts and Architecture at UNC Charlotte, effective July 1, 2008. The College brings together the talent and strengths of the current College of Architecture and the Departments of Art and Art History, Music, and Dance and Theatre, currently in the College of Arts and Sciences. The College of Architecture will become the School of Architecture within the new College.

The new entity presents increased opportunities for our students and expands the capacity of our institution to respond to and lead our region's arts and architectural communities. Creating this new college is a necessary step if UNC Charlotte is to fulfill its mission as a comprehensive public research university fully engaged in the life of the community it serves. As articulated in the Final Report of the <u>UNC Tomorrow Commission</u>, our institutions are called upon to "improve student proficiency....in creativity and innovation," to "...reward the role of the humanities and arts education," and to fulfill a major goal [4.4.4], "UNC should promote the arts and cultural enrichment in all regions of the state."

The proposal to establish a new College of Arts and Architecture was the result of deliberations of community leaders, faculty, students, and staff over the past two years. It had unanimous support from the community arts leaders, faculty of the four units, the College of Architecture Advisory Board, and the UNC Charlotte Faculty Council. A College dedicated to these disciplines and their creative development will serve our students by increasing the visibility of these disciplines in the life of the University, creating a coherent administrative structure, and facilitating interdisciplinary collaboration in scholarship, instruction, and performance within the University and externally. Our new Center City Building under construction will house the "Charlotte

Community Design Studio" and have gallery space dedicated to the presentation of arts projects in the community. This new facility will be located in the heart of Charlotte's cultural institutions and will give the new College a launching pad to more closely connect academic programs in the arts to community institutions, including the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools.
