Dear Dr. Bataille:

This letter is a notification that The University of North Carolina at Charlotte has completed consultation on changing the name of the College of Nursing and Health Professions to the College of Health and Human Services. The proposed change is the result of the work of a campus-wide Health Commission conducted as part of our planning process, a careful review by all involved units on campus, endorsements by our Faculty Council, and approval by the UNC Charlotte Board of Trustees.

If the proposed change in organizational structure is approved, a School of Nursing will be established within the College of Health and Human Services. The Department of Health Promotion and Kinesiology will be dissolved and two departments established, the Department of Kinesiology and the Department of Health Behavior and Administration. The Department of Social Work, now located within the College of Arts and Sciences, will be moved to the new college. The result will be a new organizational structure that better supports the mission of this institution.

Assuming this proposal is approved by President Broad, we ask that it then be forwarded to the Board of Governors for its consideration. Of course, Provost Trauth or I would be pleased to respond to any questions that might arise.

Proposal for Resident Tuition for Non-Residents Who Commit to Teach in North Carolina

Several universities have proposed that they be allowed to enroll out-of-state students as in-state for tuition purposes if the student will commit to teaching in the public schools in North Carolina after graduation. The Committee on Public Affairs has asked the Educational Planning Committee to review this proposal. After review by Academic Affairs, we propose that the Board of Governors seek legislation to enable this option to be made available to students enrolling at any of the fifteen campus of UNC with teacher education programs. This proposal would require a student to teach one year for each year of tuition support and to repay the difference between in-state and out-of-state tuition if the student does not fulfill the teaching requirements. Contractual arrangements would be established prior to participation to assure that the State would be repaid if the student did not fulfill the terms of the contract
