AMERICAN INDIAN EDUCATION

STATE ADVISORY ON INDIAN EDUCATION

In 1988, the State Board of Education (SBE) adopted an Indian education policy to provide a process for identifying issues pertaining to the education of American Indian students in grades K–12. In the same year, the N.C. General Assembly enacted Article 13A (NCGS § 115C-210 et seq) to establish a fifteen member State Advisory Council on Indian Education to serve as the mechanism for advocating on the behalf of American Indian students. Membership consists of American Indian parents and educators, legislative members from the N.C. Senate and House of Representatives, representatives from the UNC Board of Governors, and the the North Carolina Commission of Indian Affairs.

The Council serves a vital role in advising the State Board of Education on issues pertaining to the education of American Indian students. More specifically, the Council is charged with the following duties:

- to advise the SBE on effective educational practices for American Indian students;
- to explore programs that raise academic achievement and reduce the dropout rate among American Indian students:
- to advise the SBE and the Department of Public Instruction on ways to improve coordination and communication for the benefit of American Indian students affected by state and federal programs administered at the state level;
- to prepare and present an annual report to the SBE, tribal organizations, and to conferees at the annual North Carolina Indian Unity Conference; and
- to advise the SBE on any other aspect of American Indian education when requested by the State Board, educators, parents, students, business leaders, and other constituents.

n Friday, September 16, 2011, Forsyth County resident Nora Dial Stanley, along with six other beautiful and distinguished American Indian women, entered the gracious and hallowed society of American Indian Women of Proud Nations.

The 2011 national conference of American Indian Women of Proud Nations was held September 15th and 16th at the Raleigh Marriott Crabtree Valley in Raleigh, NC. The conference theme was "Women: Redefining Traditional Roles." Two hundred and fifty American Indian and non-Indian women and men, professionals, community members, entrepreneurs, students and tribal leaders attend this conference annually to build and foster a better understanding of American Indian people living in today's society. The conference is designed to meet the needs of American Indian communities and

organizations by offering ideas, strategies and examples of mobilizing these entities to build healthy communities. This year's event particularly focused on the changing roles of American Indian women today as they strive to incorporate indigenous cultural traditions with contemporary roles and responsibilities. No better year could have been chosen to distinguish Nora Dial Stanley while her husband, Steve Stanley, and twin children Ryan and Raven, proudly looked on

This has been the life of Nora Dial Stanley, enrolled member of the Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina, for more than 25 years. She possesses inultiple crowns in these environments but her mission for this quarter of century has been to serve rather than to reign.

She has empowered American Indian youth of all North Carolina tribes and urban organizations. She has been seated at the table of policy makers during her service with the North Carolina Commission of Indian Affairs and many other national, state, regional and local committees and/or boards. She has been a never ending warm and loving embrace to American Indian people. She has been a welcome and safe harbor to non-Indians seeking to learn more about our people, our cultures, our traditions, our strengths, our challenges and above all our shared experiences and unique identities.

From the day she was first crowned its princess, Guilford Native American Association has been at Nora's heart. The people, the families, and the community have benefited from decades of her advocacy, commitment, and service. Others have followed her in serving this community because they were warmed by the fire that is Nora Dial Stanley.

She is not afraid of new paths. She is not threatened by insecurity. She is deliberate and focused in all of her goals. Her principal goals in life are to leave her faith, her family, her cultural identity, and the gender she is so proud to represent strengthened in this world.

On any given day Nora has orchestra practice with her award winning son, Ryan, and horseback riding with his twin sister, Raven. During the same day she refines a computer program in her profession as an Information Technology Project

Manager. She finds time in that less than 24 hours to schedule a UNC-G Native American Student Association panel discussion with American Indian leaders across the state, puts together the dancers for American Indian Heritage Week in November, and then ensures that her family is safe and nurtured in the evening around fellowship and highest moral values.

Mourning Dove of the Salish said that "...everything on the Earth has a purpose, every disease an herb to cure it, and every person a mission. That is the Indian theory of existence." Nora's mission is to "wear red" and to be that person to whom others look for energy and passion, especially in her work with the International Civil Rights Museum, Greensboro, North Carolina.

The fire that is Nora Dial Stanley burns as a beacon to those around her to nurture their desire to put forth the knowledge skills and talents that they are blessed to contribute to the American Indian people of North Carolina. May her brilliant red and black forever stand to light the way for American Indian Women of Proud Nations.

Nora was nominated for this honor by her equally proud friend and brother in American Indian advocacy, Eric R. Locklear, M.Ed. [EXX]
