COMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE

Thursday, April 12, 2012

Draft Minutes

The Committee on University Governance met Thursday, April 12, 2012, at 3:30 p.m. in Conference Room C of the Spangler Center.

Committee members present included Chairman Daughtridge, Mr. Grainger, Mr. Harrelson, Mr. McMahan, Mr. Powers, Dr. Roseman, and Chancellor Mauceri. Chairman Gage, Mr. Hans, Dr. Flood, Mr. Mitchell, and Mr. Taylor attended. Chancellor Carter was in attendance as was George Burnette, Chief Operating Office at the School of the Arts. Mr. James Daniel Bell, Jr., a former member of the State Advisory Council on Indian Education, was in attendance. President Ross, Vice President and General Counsel Fjeld, Senior Advisor to the President Gray and Secretary Corgnati attended as staff.

Approval of Minutes

Upon motion of Mr. Grainger, and seconded by Dr. Roseman, the committee voted to approve the minutes of the February 9, 2012, meeting of the committee.

Discussion of Vacancies on Boards and Councils

The committee discussed vacancies on councils and boards of trustees.

There is a partial term ending June 30, 2013, on the University of North Carolina at Pembroke Board of Trustees. Upon motion of Dr. Roseman and seconded by Mr. McMahan, the Committee voted to recommend the election of Dr. Wiley G. Barrett of Southern Pines to serve. The resume of Dr. Barrett is presented as Appendix A.

There is a partial term ending June 30, 2015, on the University of North Carolina School of the Arts Board of Trustees. Upon motion of Mr. Grainger and seconded by Mr. Powers, the Committee voted to recommend the election of Mr. Noel L. Dunn of Chicago to serve. The resume of Mr. Dunn is presented as Appendix B.

There are two partial terms ending June 30, 2013, on the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics Board of Trustees, representing Congressional Districts 3 and 11. Action was deferred on both vacancies.

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There is a partial term ending June 30, 2012, on the State Advisory Council on Indian Education. Upon motion of Mr. McMahan and seconded by Mr. Grainger, the Committee voted to recommend the election of Mr. Bill James Brewington of Roland to serve. The resume of Dr. Brewington is presented as Appendix C.

There are three terms ending June 30, 2017, on the University of North Carolina Press Board of Governors. The incumbents are William Leuchtenburg, Barbara Moran and Louise Maynor. Professors Moran and Maynor are not eligible for reappointment. President Ross received nominations for the three terms from Chancellor Thorp in accordance with traditional nomination procedures. Action was deferred.

There is a partial term ending June 30, 2013, on the Winston-Salem State University Board of Trustees. This vacancy results from the resignation of Scott Bauer of Winston-Salem and will be announced.

Student Discipline Policies

The Committee received an update from Vice President and General Counsel Fjeld on the review of student discipline policies, and discussed a draft of proposed policy amendments. Upon motion of Mr. Harrelson and seconded by Mr. Grainger, the Committee approved the proposed policy amendments to Policy 1300.1, *Illegal Drugs*. See Appendix D. The Committee will bring the amended policy to the Board of Governors for consideration at the June meeting.

Campus Litigation

Vice President and General Counsel Fjeld reported on the successful litigation on behalf of East Carolina University vs. Roy P. Hopkins, Jr., an individual d/b/a Healthy Pirates and HealthyPirates.com.

Mr. Powers moved, and duly seconded, that the Committee go into closed session to consult with its attorney to consider and give instructions concerning judicial actions involving East Carolina University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Western Carolina University, pursuant to North Carolina G.S. Section 143-318.11 (a) (3). The motion carried.

Dr. Roseman moved, seconded by Mr. Grainger, that the Committee reconvene in open session. The motion carried.

The Committee received the updated 2012 Spring Commencement schedule and the updated Board of Trustees meeting schedule.

Illegal Drugs

I. Purpose

Illegal drugs endanger the health and salety of members of higher education communities and imperil the integrity of the pursuit of learning. The institutions of the University of North Carolina are not immune to this threat. Illegal drugs constitute such a serious problem nationwide that within the University system certain specific and uniform. University policies are warranted. Success in combating the problem depends ultimately on the cooperative efforts of members of governing boards, students, faculty members, administrators and all other employees. Thus, it is on each campus of the University that a properly balanced program of educational efforts and punitive sanctions must be achieved. Accordingly, to support and assist the constituent institutions of the University of North Carolina in their continuing efforts to meet this threat, the Board of Governors adopts this policy.

II. Policies Applicable University-Wide

Each Board of Trustees shall adopt a policy on illegal drugs applicable to all students, faculty, and staff. The Board of Governors recognizes that each such policy must address the circumstances and needs of the particular campus. However, the President shall ensure that the policy of each institution incorporates and is fully consistent with the following basic requirements.

- A Education, Counseling, and Rehabilitation
 - Lach constituent institution shall establish and maintain a program of education designed to help all members of the University community avoid involvement with illegal drugs. This educational program shall emphasize these subjects.
 - a The incompatibility of the possession, use or sale of illegal drugs with the goals of the University,
 - b The legal consequences of involvement with illegal drugs.
 - c The medical implications of the use of illegal drugs, and
 - d The ways in which illegal drugs jeopardize an individual's present accomplishments and future opportunities.
 - 2 Each constituent institution shall provide information about drug counseling and rehabilitation services available to members of the University community either through campus-based programs of through community-based organizations. Persons who voluntarily avail themselves of University services shall be assured that applicable professional standards of confidentiality will be observed.

B Enforcement and Penalties

- University institutions shall take all actions necessary, consistent with state and federal law and applicable University policy, to eliminate illegal drugs from the University community. The institutional policy on illegal drugs shall be publicized in catalogues and other materials prepared for all enrolled and prospective students and in materials distributed to faculty and staff.
- Students, faculty, and staff_are responsible, as citizens, for knowing about and complying with the provisions of North Carolina law that make it a crime to possess, sell, deliver, or manufacture those drugs designated collectively as "controlled substances" in Article 5 of Chapter 90 of the North Carolina General Statutes. Any member of the University community who violates that law is subject both to prosecution and punishment by the civil authorities and to disciplinary proceedings by the University. It is not "double jeopardy" for both the civil authorities and the University to proceed against and punish a person for the same specified conduct. The University will initiate its own disciplinary proceeding against a student, faculty member, or staff member when the alleged conduct is deemed to affect the interests of the University.

- Penalties will be imposed by the University in accordance with procedural safeguards applicable to disciplinary actions against students, faculty, and staff, as required by Section 502D(3) and Section 603 of *The Code*, by Board of Governors policies applicable to other employees exempt from the State Personnel Act, and by regulations of the State Personnel Commission
- Penalties to be imposed by the University will vary depending upon the nature and seriousness of the offense, and may include a range of disciplinary actions up to and including expulsion from enrollment and discharge from employment. The University may also refer matters to law enforcement for prosecution
 - a For second or other subsequent offenses involving illegal drugs, progressively more severe penalties shall be imposed
 - b A student, faculty member, or staff member found to have violated applicable law of University policies concerning illegal drugs may be required to participate in a drug education and counseling program, consent to regular drug testing, and accept such other conditions and restrictions, including a program of community service, as the chancellor or the chancellor's designed deems appropriate. Refusal or failure to abide by such conditions and restrictions may result in additional disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion from enrollment and discharge from employment.

5 Suspension Pending Final Disposition

When a student, faculty member, or staff member has been charged by the University with a violation of policies concerning illegal drugs, he or she may be suspended from enrollment or employment before initiation of completion of regular disciplinary proceedings if, assuming the truth of the charges the chancellor or the chancellor's designee concludes that the person's continued presence within the University community would constitute a clear and immediate danger to the health or welfare of other members of the University community, provided, that if such a suspension is imposed, an appropriate hearing of the charges against the suspended person shall be held in accordance with applicable campus judicial policy

III Implementation and Reporting

- A Lach Board of Trustees shall adopt a policy on illegal drugs, the provisions of which shall be consistent with the requirements of Section II of this policy
- B Each chancellor shall designate a coordinator of drug education. This person, acting under the authority of the chancellor, will be responsible for overseeing all actions and programs relating to the campus policy.
- C University institutions must comply with applicable state and federal law regarding illegal drugs including, without limitation, the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989. In accordance with the latter, each institution must conduct a biennial review of the effectiveness of its educational programs regarding illegal drugs and the consistency of sanction enforcement, and maintain the results of such reviews on file.
