11. Reverse Transfer Program Update Kate Henz / Michelle Blackwell

Situation: Information will be presented regarding the North Carolina Reverse Transfer

Program.

Background: In the Fall of 2012, UNC General Administration and North Carolina

Community College System received a grant from the USA Funds to develop technology tools, policies, and procedures to support the reverse transfer of credit for students who transfer before completing a credential at the community college. When implemented, a student will be able to "transfer back" credits completed at the university that fulfill the AA/AS requirements so

that the community college may award an associate's degree.

Reverse transfer has several benefits: first, the number of degree completers in NC will increase; second, we are hopeful that it will improve overall

baccalaureate degree completion; and third, the student receives a credential

that he/she would not otherwise have received.

Assessment: North Carolina is on target to meet goal of awarding 2,094 associate degrees

through Reverse Transfer by the end of 2014.

What is Reverse Transfer?

UNC

Student attends UNC, accumulating additional credits towards Bachelor's degree.

Reverse <u>Transfer</u>

Credit accumulated at UNC is sent back to Community Colleges.

UNC

Student continues pursuit of Bachelor's Degree.

Student attends a community college

Transfer

Student transfers to UNC without Associate's Degree.

Why is Reverse Transfer Important?: National Degree Completion Numbers

Nationally:

55% of students who transfer from a community college without an associate degree complete the bachelor's degree.

North Carolina transfer students have similar success rates.



Why is Reverse Transfer Important?: Helping Students Complete

Incentive to increase the number of students completing the bachelor's degree.

"I'm finding that the prospect of having my official associate's degree is helping me to push me over the "2 year-hump" to my bachelor's program."

Why is Reverse Transfer Important?: Rewards student work

For the student who does not complete the bachelor's degree the associate degree increases their lifetime earnings potential.

Reverse Transfer provides students with the degree that conveys their postsecondary accomplishments to potential employers.



Student Reactions to Reverse Transfer

"I have just submitted my information to have my credits evaluated to see if I qualify for my associate's degree. I think this is a great benefit and hope many can benefit from it." (UNCG female)

"Oh wow, thanks - I am sharing the knowledge here." (UNCC female)



"I received an email about the reverse transfer program. I was delighted to hear that I can receive an associates as well as my bachelor's degree." (FSU female)

"I truly do not mean to pester you about this. I've just been waiting a long time. Getting these degrees has taken me 6 years." (UNCC male)



"Making the decision to transfer prior to finishing an AA or AS is difficult and often involves monetary constraints and/or required course access.

I foresee this opportunity to receive acknowledgement of the earned AA or AS degree as a way to help bolster the transfer student's psychological resolve to complete the four year degree.

I hope the UNCC administration utilizes this program in their student retention/degree completion toolkit." (UNCC female)
