Request for Authorization to Discontinue the Bachelor of Science Degree in Dance Education at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro

Introduction

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro is requesting authorization to discontinue its Bachelor of Science in Dance Education (CIP 13.1324).

Program Description

Deletion of this offering is based upon an analysis of the needs of students in the state. Dance Education programs at the bachelor's level are offered at four universities in North Carolina, and the programs at UNCG have had low enrollments in recent years. Discontinuation of this program will allow the Dance Department to reallocate its resources and energies to the Masters degree in Dance Education, in which UNCG offers the only program in the state.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approved the request to discontinue the Bachelor of Science in Dance Education effective September 1, 2007.

Request for Authorization to Establish a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Design Studies at North Carolina State University

Introduction

North Carolina State University requests authorization to establish a Bachelor of Arts degree in Design Studies (CIP 50.0703) in August 2007.

Program Description

The focus of the program is the study of the history and theory of the design disciplines, specifically, architecture, industrial design, graphic design, landscape architecture, crafts, textiles, and material culture. The program focuses on those arts that have a foot in both the fine arts and the practical arts. Students are encouraged to take the broadest view of the history of those arts with origins in "techne" or craft, relate this to the sciences (physical, life, and social), examine the cultural and political histories of the arts, and explore development of the arts in non-Western cultures. After students have acquired an introduction to the history of design, aesthetic inquiry, and methods of historical research, they will develop a focus area in consultation with Design Studies faculty, which will result in a capstone research project. The program is intended to stimulate cross-disciplinary activity within the College of Design. The program will provide tools students can use to understand the global context of modern design, and a faculty member with expertise in non-Western traditions will be hired.

Program Need

This degree program would be unique in North Carolina in its examination of the impact of science on the arts and the arts on science. The program is intended to produce graduates capable of synergistic thinking who will bring to the workplace the ability to produce creative innovations. Many NCSU students in the College of Design seek a program that does not lead directly to a professional degree. This program will address the desire of these students to obtain a more general liberal education as undergraduates before they proceed to graduate school. The minor in Design Studies has grown to approximately 20 students, and many of these students would pursue this major. It is anticipated that approximately 60 students will be enrolled in the program by its fourth year.

Resources

Facilities are currently adequate for the program. One existing faculty member will be reassigned to the program. As noted above, a faculty member with expertise in non-Western traditions will be hired, and two additional faculty will be hired in the third year with enrollment increase funding.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approve the request to establish a BA in Design Studies degree (CIP 50.0703) at North Carolina State University effective August 2007.

Request for Authorization to Establish a Bachelor of Science Degree in Public Health at UNC Charlotte

Introduction

UNC Charlotte requests authorization to establish a Bachelor of Science degree in Public Health (CIP 51.2207) effective August 2007.

Program Description

The proposed BS in Public Health is designed to prepare students with knowledge and skills in the core concepts of public health including: health behavior, research and statistics in health, environmental health, epidemiology, and health administration as well as in the planning, evaluation, organization, and delivery of community and public health services. The interdisciplinary focus will include completion of a minor, electives, and experiential learning. The degree will prepare students for health-related careers in health promotion, program delivery, health communication, community organization, and behavior change positions in health departments, public health agencies, community-based organizations, outreach education programs, hospitals, private health organizations, and corporate wellness settings. The program is designed to appeal to students interested in population health rather than clinical health.

Program Need

The Department of Health Behavior and Administration offers a minor in Interdisciplinary Health Studies that attracts approximately 100 students each semester, many of whom would be interested in this major. The need for a competent public health workforce has been described in several publication, including a Bureau of Health Professions conclusion that only 20 percent of the nation's public health professionals have the education and training needed to do their jobs effectively. Issues such as the aging population, health disparities, and chronic disease are increasing the need for competent population-based scholar-practitioners. Community leaders on the Department's Public Health Advisory Board have expressed a need for well-prepared workers in the areas of health promotion, program delivery, health communication, community organization, and behavior change. It is anticipated that 90 full-time and 20 part-time students would be enrolled in the program by its fourth year.

Resources

The Department is currently recruiting five additional full-time faculty to be funded by enrollment increase funding that has come to the Department. The program will be housed in a new fully equipped, state-of-the-art building for the College of Health and Human Services.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approve the UNC-Charlotte request to establish a Bachelor of Science degree in Public Health (CIP 51.2207) effective August 2007.

Request for Authorization to Establish a Bachelor of Science Degree in Information Technology at UNC-Pembroke

Introduction

UNC-Pembroke notified UNC-GA of its intent to plan a BS in Information Technology degree (CIP 11.0103) in March 2006. UNC-Pembroke requests authorization to establish the degree in August 2007.

Program Description

The proposed program will provide students with the skills and knowledge necessary for them to: explain and apply appropriate information technologies and methodologies to help an organization achieve its goals and objectives; manage the information technology resources of an organization; anticipate the changing direction of information technology and evaluate and communicate the likely utility of new technologies; and understand and contribute to the scientific, mathematical and theoretical foundations on which information technologies are built. The program will incorporate some existing Computer Science and Mathematics courses as well as develop new Information Technology courses. In contrast to some programs that are more theoretical, the program will emphasize practical hands-on training that will prepare them to enter the information technology workforce.

Program Need

The development of this degree is timely with regard to the shortfall of trained professionals in information technology in the region and state-wide. The proposed degree is viewed as a means to enhance economic development in the region and State. Recent graduates have indicated a need for additional, more specific training to qualify for better jobs, and the program will provide the additional knowledge and skills necessary to make graduates more competitive. It is anticipated that the program will enroll 20 to 28 students by its fourth year.

Resources

Most courses will be taught by the existing Computer Science faculty although one additional tenure-track member will be hired with enrollment funds. The Oxendine Science Building has been recently renovated and expanded with increased lecture, laboratory, and office space. Current technology available is entirely adequate and grant funding will be sought for future equipment needs.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approve the UNC-Pembroke request to establish a BS in Information Technology degree (CIP 11.0103) in August 2007.

Request for Authorization to Establish a Master of Science Degree in Disaster Management at UNC-Chapel Hill

Introduction

UNC-Chapel Hill requests authorization to establish the MS in Disaster Management degree (CIP 11.0802) effective July 2007.

Program Description

The purpose of this degree is to help responders (e.g., emergency management, emergency medical services, fire fighting, law enforcement, security, business continuity) to acquire the skills and adaptive expertise needed to succeed in the management and coordination of response and recovery to disasters. The curriculum has been designed around (1) the knowledge that disaster managers must acquire, and (2) the skills for adaptive expertise: critical, strategic, systems, ethical, and creative thinking; problem solving; decision making (analytic and intuitive); and leadership. A successful national disaster management program depends upon a cadre of professional disaster executives and managers who have the flexibility, the creativity, and the meta-skills to adapt to any emergency or disaster. Consequently, the curriculum is heavy on decision analysis, analytic methods, and command and leadership skills. This degree is being offered in the distance (executive) format so that cohorts can be drawn from a national pool of qualified applicants who are currently employed in disaster management occupations or who have relevant experience and want to move into disaster management. The distance education format will enable students to continue working as they acquire new knowledge and skills, often an important option for mid-career professionals and critical for organizations who desire to keep valuable employee s on the job.

Program Need

A review of extant resources (e.g., statistics from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, US Department of Labor; articles; websites of professional organizations; and interviews) indicates that for the most part, first and second responders and those responsible for the development and implementation of disaster management services are under-prepared to deal with catastrophic events. Even though the Federal government has played a major role in disaster preparedness through its requirements for the development of standards and its Office of Homeland Security, the overall infrastructure of disaster management undergirded by education, training and certification in disaster management is inadequate. Training is critical to maintain a well-informed and competent workforce that can respond to natural and man-made disasters.

Resources

Infrastructure to support the online MSDM program is largely in place, and the Department also has faculty, program staff, and mechanisms in place for admissions screening, registration, and student advising. Staff members are available (program manager, program coordinator), the Department (registrar and assistant registrar, office assistants, technical support) and within the School (technical support) to provide faculty and students with the assistance necessary to conduct the MSDM program effectively.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approve the UNC-Chapel Hill request to establish the MS in Disaster Management degree (CIP 11.0802) effective August 2007.

Request for Authorization to Establish a Master of Arts Degree in Criminology and Public Sociology at UNC-Wilmington

Introduction

UNC-Wilmington notified UNC-GA of its intent to plan a Master of Arts degree in Criminology and Public Sociology (CIP 45.1101) in February 2007. UNCW requests authorization to establish the degree effective August 2007.

Program Description

Students will be able to concentrate in either criminology or public sociology in learning theoretical and methodological tools that will enable them to acquire and apply specific information to particular problems. The diverse interests of the graduate faculty will accommodate a variety of interests. In public sociology, specific strengths include study of rural and urban poverty, race-gender class inequalities and stratification, social structure and organizational power, globalization, and culture and media. In criminology, strengths include not only traditional criminal justice studies but criminological theory and social justice including restorative justice. Students will work with faculty to develop an individualized course of study. It is anticipated that 25 full-time and 5 part-time students will be enrolled by the fourth year of the program.

Program Need

Increasingly, non-academic employers (government, social, service, commercial, public, and private agencies, programs and businesses) need social science skills and reliable information that they can use to assess policy and plan, monitor, and evaluate their efforts. The theoretical and methodological developments in the social sciences can address the acute need for professional skills that apply information to specific problems. In recent years the Sociology and Criminal Justice Department has been approached by a variety of organizations with requests for competent MA individuals who can fill positions in applied social science and criminal justice areas, in the management of research and related positions. Research shows that students graduating from traditional graduate social science curricula felt they lacked the skills to work in non-academic areas such as those described. The proposed program will address this mismatch between traditional academic and applied professional curricula by providing students with training to seek employment in federal, state, and local governmental and private-sector organizations.

Resources

Three new tenure-track faculty were hired this year, and, as enrollments grow, two additional faculty will be hired in the second year of the program and one each in the third and fourth years. Facilities and technology resources are adequate to accommodate the program.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Governors approve the UNCW request to establish the MA in Criminology and Public Sociology degree (CIP 45.1101) effective August 2007.

DRAFT 2007 Prospective Teacher Scholars Focused Growth Pilot Report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee

ABSTRACT

The University of North Carolina was directed in 2002 to establish a pilot program at three of the Focused Growth campuses to recruit new non-resident students, who will be eligible to receive resident tuition rates, if they agree to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors is required to report annually to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

The participating campuses are Elizabeth City State University (ECSU), University of North Carolina at Pembroke (UNC-P), and Western Carolina University (WCU). Each campus is permitted to have a total of 20 students in the program at any given time. Currently, there are a total of forty-one students representing fifteen different states enrolled at a cost of \$373,042 for tuition waivers. Funding to support the difference in resident and non-resident tuition is allocated from the campuses focused growth funds. In the fourth year of the pilot, the first student graduate matriculated in December of 2006 from WCU. Tracking graduates of this program to employment in North Carolina public schools will be included in the 2007-08 annual report.

DRAFT 2007 Prospective Teacher Scholars Focused Growth Pilot Report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee

Attracting and retaining high quality teachers for North Carolina's public schools is of critical importance. The University of North Carolina's deep, urgent commitment to ensuring a sufficient supply of high quality teachers for the state's public school classrooms is evidenced in our fifteen teacher education programs' efforts to recruit, prepare, license, and further develop the states' teacher workforce. One promising recruitment model that is being piloted on three campuses is the Prospective Teacher Scholars Focused Growth Pilot program. This unique pilot is one of the many ways the University is responding to the state's teacher supply-demand gap.

The pilot program was established in 2003-04 on three of the University of North Carolina's focused growth campuses; Elizabeth City State University (ECSU), UNC Pembroke (UNC-P), and Western Carolina University (WCU). The focused growth pilot program, entitled the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program, allows these campuses to recruit non-resident students to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Participating students must sign a promissory note with the institution agreeing to teach an equal number of years in North Carolina. If the student later decides not to pursue teacher education or does not teach in North Carolina, the student will be charged the difference between resident and non-resident tuition, plus interest. Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors developed guidelines and regulations for the pilot programs and reported to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee Chairs on November 12, 2002.

This report provides information on the progress and costs of the pilot program on each of the three participating campuses to date. The data in Tables 1-4 presents specific campus information about the pilot, as well as collective totals for the three participating focused growth campuses. One scholar to date from the 2003-04 cohort, graduated in December 2006 of this year from WCU. Total tuition waiver costs to date are \$1,039,014. Legislation enacting this pilot is provided in Attachment 1. The UNC Board of Governors' guidelines and regulations, 800.4.1, adopted on November 8, 2002 are provided in Attachment 2.

Table 1 presents data for 2003-04. In the first year of the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program, fifteen scholars were enrolled on the three campuses participating in this focused growth pilot: five at ECSU, two at UNC-P, and eight at WCU. The 2003-04 tuition waiver costs for the fifteen newly enrolled students was \$134,936. The cost by campus for the first year of the pilot was \$41,320 at ECSU, \$18,728 at UNC-P, and \$74,888 at WCU.

Table 2 provides data for 2004-05, the second year of the pilot. In this year, thirteen of the fifteen scholars returned and the campuses collectively enrolled an additional fourteen new scholars. Seven of the fourteen new scholars and five returning enrolled at ECSU, three new and one returning scholar enrolled

at UNC-P, and four new and seven returning scholars enrolled at WCU. A total of twenty-seven scholars were enrolled in the program in the 2004-05 academic year, increasing the tuition waiver costs for the program in year two to \$227,468. The cost by campus for the second year of the pilot was \$100,068 at ECSU, \$33,040 at UNC-P, and \$94,360 at WCU.

Data in Table 3 provides information for the 2005-06 academic year, including the total tuition waiver costs for the three years the pilot program had been in existence. In 2005-06, the third year of the pilot program, twenty-four of the prior years twenty-seven scholars returned, and the campuses collectively enrolled an additional eleven new scholars. Eleven of the twenty-four returning scholars and five new scholars enrolled in the Fall

semester at ECSU, two returning and one new scholar enrolled at UNC-P, and eleven returning and five new scholars enrolled at WCU (one scholar dropped out after Fall 2005, leaving fifteen

enrolled). A total of thirty-four scholars were enrolled in the program in the 2005-06 academic year, increasing the tuition waiver costs for the program in year three to \$289,679. The cost by campus for the third year of the pilot was \$129,255 at ECSU, \$28,320 at UNC-P, and \$132,104 at WCU. Total tuition waiver costs to date for the third year of the pilot was \$666,239; \$270,643 at ECSU, \$84,808 at UNC-P, and \$310,788 at WCU.

Data from the fourth year of the pilot, 2006-07, is provided in Table 4. In this year, twenty-eight of the prior years scholars returned. An additional fourteen new scholars were enrolled across the pilot campuses for a total of forty-one enrolled scholars; eighteen at ECSU, seven at UNC-P, and sixteen at WCU. The total tuition waiver costs for 2006-07 is \$373,042; \$150,102 at ECSU, \$64,820 at UNC-P, and \$158,120 at WCU. The first student graduate from the 2003-04 cohort matriculated in December 2006 from WCU.

Tuition waiver costs expended by the three participating focused growth campuses to date for the four years the Prospective Teacher Scholars Program has been in existence is \$1,039,281; \$420,745 at ECSU, \$149,628 at UNC-P, and \$468,908 at WCU. Students have been recruited from fifteen states; CA, CT, FL, GA, KS, MA, MD, MI, MN, NY, OH, PA, SC, TN, and VA. Eighteen scholars have come from the North Carolina border states of South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia.

TECHNICAL NOTES:

Elizabeth City State University – In 2003-04 the difference of out-of-state and in-state tuition at ECSU was \$8,264, in 2004-05 the tuition differential was \$8,339 and in 2005-06 the differential remains the same. In 2005-06, two of the fifteen scholars that enrolled in the fall of 2005 have dropped out of the program, leaving thirteen enrolled in the Spring 2006 semester. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at ECSU is \$8,339.

UNC Pembroke – In the 2003-04 year, UNC-P made fifteen offers and three accepted. In addition, one of the three was removed from the program because the student's father was retroactively charged the in-state tuition rate due to a military residency waiver. In 2003-04 the difference in out-of-state and in-state tuition at UNC-P was \$9,364. In the 2004-05 year, UNC-P made fourteen offers with three accepting, and one of two students returning from the prior year. One of the returning scholars from the 2003-04 year transferred to UNC Wilmington. In 2004-05 the tuition differential at UNC-P was \$9,440. The differential remains the same in 2005-06. For the 2006-07 year, two scholarships were offered with one accepting. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at UNC-P is \$9,260.

Western Carolina University – Costs in 2003-04 reflect tuition waivers for eight students (one student dropped out). In 2003-04 the difference in out-of-state and in-state tuition at WCU was \$9,361. Costs in 2004-05 reflect tuition waivers for five students (one student dropped out). In 2004-05 the tuition differential at WCU was \$9,436 and in 2005-06 the differential remains the same. In 2005-06, one of the sixteen scholars that enrolled in the fall of 2005 has dropped out of the program, leaving fifteen enrolled in the Spring 2006 semester. The tuition differential for 2006-07 at WCU is \$9,583.

SENATE BILL 1115, SECTION 9.9 (2001)

FOCUSED GROWTH PILOT PROGRAM

SECTION 9.9. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina may allow Elizabeth City State University, the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, and Western Carolina University each to allocate up to one hundred seventy-eight thousand three hundred eighty dollars (\$178,380) of the funds allocated to them for focused enrollment growth for a maximum of 20 Prospective Teacher Scholars. These funds may be used to recruit new nonresident students to enter into agreements to: (i) pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and (ii) teach in a North Carolina public school or a school operated by the United States government in North Carolina for one year for each year that they receive this benefit. The Board of Governors shall establish guidelines and regulations for this pilot program, including methodology for determining its success in increasing the supply of qualified teachers for North Carolina public schools. The Board shall report its guidelines and regulations to guide these pilot programs to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by November 15, 2002. The Board shall report annually to the Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

PROSPECTIVE TEACHER SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The University of North Carolina has been directed to establish a pilot program at three of the Focused Growth campuses to recruit new nonresident students to pursue a full-time course of study that will lead to teacher certification in North Carolina and to employment teaching in a North Carolina public school (or school operated by the United States government in North Carolina). Pursuant to Senate Bill 1115, Section 9.9 (2001), the UNC Board of Governors is required to report guidelines and regulations for these pilot programs to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by November 15, 2002, and then report annually to the Committee on the progress of the pilot programs and their costs.

The following policies are to be used for implementation of the Prospective Teacher Scholar programs at Elizabeth City State University, the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, and Western Carolina University.

- 1. The Prospective Teacher Scholar funds are to be used for non-resident students who make a commitment to pursue a degree in teacher education at one of the three constituent institutions, ECSU, UNCP, or WCU.
- 2. The Prospective Teacher Scholar program is a scholarship-loan program. Scholarship funds will be used to pay the difference between the cost of resident tuition and fees and non-resident tuition and fees. For each year the student receives the scholarship-loan, the student must teach full-time for an academic year in a North Carolina (K-12) public school or a school operated by the United States Government in North Carolina. The student will have a maximum of seven (7) years or two years time for each year of the scholarship (whichever is less) from the date of graduation to fulfill the payback agreement by teaching in a North Carolina public school.
- 3.
- a. Eligibility to participate in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program is limited to non-resident students who enter as a new freshman or as an undergraduate transfer student, and will be enrolled full-time each fall and spring semester, and make satisfactory progress toward a teaching degree.
- b. The student must maintain a satisfactory GPA and be in good standing with the university each year of study.

- c. The student must meet the criteria and be admitted to the Teacher Education program by the beginning of the Junior year.
- d. The student must graduate and be eligible for a license to teach in a North Carolina public school within six months after graduation.
- 4. Students participating in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program will not be included in the campus' cap of 18% freshmen non-resident students.
- 5. Any Prospective Teacher Scholar student who chooses to attend summer school classes will be eligible for the in-state resident rate for tuition and fees.
- 6. Each recipient of a Prospective Teacher Scholar scholarship-loan is required to sign a promissory note, along with a surety, agreeing that if the student does not fulfill the payback requirement to teach in a North Carolina public school (as described in #2), the student will be required to repay the campus the differential between the resident and non-resident tuition and fees for each year they do not fulfill the payback requirement. The student will also be required to pay the campus the cost as identified above plus 10% interest on the identified amount which begins to accrue from the date of graduation or the date the student transfers to another institution or the date the student is no longer enrolled full-time and full-term, whichever is earliest.
- 7. Any Prospective Teacher Scholar recipient who does not complete the teacher education program or who terminates the degree program will be subject to the repayment of the scholarship as described in item #6.
- 8. Awards may begin as early as the spring 2003 semester for new freshmen or new transfer students. Currently enrolled students are not eligible to participate in the Prospective Teacher Scholar program.
- 9. Students selected as Prospective Teacher Scholar recipients will be eligible for consideration for additional merit awards and non-state funded need-based financial aid.
- 10. The Prospective Teacher Scholar scholarship-loan must be considered as part of the student's financial aid package. When the total financial aid award exceeds financial need, the scholarship may not be reduced to prevent an over-award.
- 11. The campus shall forgive the repayment if it finds that it is impossible for a person to comply with the requirements of item #2 or item #6 because of the person's death or permanent disability. The campus may forgive the repayment if the President finds that a person could not comply with the requirements of item #2 or item #6 for extraordinary circumstances not within the person's control.
