# **Brief Description**

This comprehensive university offers undergraduate and graduate programs leading to the baccalaureate and master's degrees in its College of Arts and Sciences, the Schools of Business, Education, and Library and Information Sciences, as well as the first professional degree in the School of Law. The Graduate School coordinates graduate admissions and enrollment, and the University College coordinates Summer School, Extension, Distant Learning, and Non-degree Credit programs. Continuing its commitment to equal opportunity, North Carolina Central University (NCCU) vigorously recruits, and strives to enroll a larger number of white and other minority students.

### **History**


Founded by Dr. James E. Shepard in 1909 and chartered as the National Religious Training School and Chautauqua (for "Meeting Place") to train community leaders. It operated as a private, nonsectarian institution from 1910 until 1923 when it became the statesupported Durham Normal School. In 1925, it became the nation's first state-supported liberal arts college for black people and was accredited as an "A" class institution in 1937. Renamed North Carolina Central University in 1969 and merged into the University of North Carolina in 1972.


#### Location


