Authorization of Tuition for 2006-07

I. <u>2006-07 Tuition Rates</u>

The tuition and fee policy of the Board of Governors provides a framework for the Board to use in reviewing and approving increases in tuition and fees on an annual basis. In addition to the tuition policy, in November 2005, the Board adopted parameters for campuses to follow in recommending *undergraduate resident tuition and general fee rate* increases for the 2006-07 academic year. The parameters were developed based upon a three-year average of nationwide percentage increases shown in the 2004-05 Washington State Tuition and Fee Report. The dollar amounts that reflect these increases are shown below.

The established guidelines did not apply to increases in debt service fees or a fee that provides operating funds for facilities previously approved by the Board. In addition, the parameters did not apply to undergraduate nonresident rates, graduate, and professional schools increases. Chancellors recommended undergraduate nonresident rates, graduate and professional school tuition increases as allowed by the Board's tuition policy.

It is proposed that the following increases in tuition and fees for undergraduate, graduate, and professional students be considered as requested by the campuses, consistent with the parameters established by the Board. Appalachian State University communicated to the Board

of Governors the need to exceed the tuition and fee parameters to support a \$400 tuition increase. Three campuses recommended a tuition differential for undergraduate and graduate students. East Carolina University requests a \$200 tuition increase for undergraduate students, and a \$300 increase for graduate students. At the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill a \$250 increase is requested for resident undergraduate students, \$1,100 for nonresident students, and a \$500 tuition increase for all graduate students. In addition, Western Carolina University proposed a \$253 increase for resident undergraduate students, \$400 for nonresident students, and a \$150 tuition increase for all graduate students.

Proposals submitted below increase the pool of financial aid funding, expand student services, ensure competitiveness in faculty salaries, and continue to meet the Board's directives to reduce class size, increase section offerings, and hire more permanent and less part-time faculty.

The College of Design proposes a \$1,000 tuition increase for students in the School of Architecture and the Department of Graphic Design. The additional revenue will enhance the studio experiences of students through expanded professional development, an enhanced public lecture program, and additional distinguished visiting studio critics.

UNC-Chapel Hill

Law Resident Students: \$800 for 2006-07 (entering Fall 2006)

Nonresident Students: \$1,000 for 2006-07 (entering Fall 2006)

The School of Law seeks additional funding to hire additional faculty to address curricular needs in core subjects, increase instructional support, and to provide additional financial aid.

Medicine (M.D. Candidate) Resident Students: \$467 for 2006-07

Nonresident Students: \$467 for 2006-07

Resident Students: \$490 for 2007-08 Nonresident Students: \$490 for 2007-08

Resident Students: \$515 for 2008-09 Nonresident Students: \$515 for 2008-09

The School of Medicine proposes a five percent increase for the next three years based on the resident tuition rates. Twenty-five percent of the incremental tuition will be earmarked for student financial aid. The balance of the revenue generated would be used to provide partial salary support to faculty professional development advisors, support funding for simulated patients, to provide partial salary support for staff in the administration of the Careers in Medicine Program, to purchase a human patient simulator, and to support, maintain, and upgrade technology for the clinical skills laboratory.

The tuition rates that follow reflect the campus-initiated tuition proposals submitted by all institutions for 2006-07.

II. Special Tuition Rates for Nonresident Students, 2006-07

Each year, the Board of Governors establishes special tuition rates for two groups of nonresident students in accordance with a Board Resolution approved July 29, 1983. The two groups of students identified in the Resolution are as follows:

- Group 1. Undergraduate students deemed by the institution to have special talents and qualifications and who are thereby awarded by the institution a scholarship or fellowship at a rate of at least \$250 per academic year. The North Carolina School of the Arts may identify categories within this group in accordance with established institutional practice.
- Group 2. Graduate students who are awarded by the institution a graduate teaching or research assistantship and who are paid a stipend at a rate of at least \$2,000 per academic year.

Effective with the Fall Term of 2006, the special tuition rates for the specific groups of nonresident students identified above are proposed as shown on the following page. The new rates reflect the tuition increases proposed in Section I.

III. <u>Tuition for Students Enrolled in Degree-Credit Distance Education Courses</u>

It is proposed that, effective with the fall semester 2006, resident students and nonresident students taking courses within North Carolina that are enrolled in distance education courses be charged the regular-term tuition rates established in Section I. It is further proposed that tuition rates for these students be implemented on a per-credit-hour basis and that the charge per credit hour be calculated as follows:

- For undergraduate courses, the rate per student credit hour would be the annual rate divided by 29.6 hours.
- For graduate courses, the rate per student credit hour would be the annual rate divided by 20.4 hours.

It is further proposed that the Board delegate to the President the authority to set tuition rates for nonresident students taking courses outside North Carolina. These are students who primarily take courses via the Internet.
