Ultimately, reinvigorating student involvement in ASG, the relevance of the organization and relaying a

foundation that was disrupted by COVID was a large portion of our year and I am happy to say that we've accomplished that.

Additionally, I am excited to share a piece of legislation written and passed during our March Meeting, a Resolution of Appreciation for Chair Randy Ramsey for his work here within the Board of Governors and University of North Carolina System. Alongside our incoming ASG President and student board member, Cameron Brown, we are excited to present you with the framed legislation at the May meeting. We, as students, are greatly appreciative at the work being done to continue to have access to an affordable and quality education, and with that we say thank you.

Over a year ago, I was elected to become the President of the Association, around 11 months ago I took an oath to join this body as its student member. Every experience I've had has reaffirmed that higher education is a field that I love, would work and make an impact in. I continue to urge that this body and those that support to look through the lenses of the potential future, to make decisions holistically and to remember one large thing. Higher education is the business of changing the trajectory of the lives of our communities. IT changes lives. Just like it's changed mine.
