May 22, 2024 at 10:15 a.m. Via Videoconference and PBS North Carolina Livestream UNC System Office 223 S. West Street, Board Room (17th Floor) Raleigh, North Carolina

This meeting of the Committee on Budget and Finance was presided over by Chair Jimmy Clark. The following committee members, constituting a quorum, were also present in person or by phone: Harry Brown, Joel Ford, Reginald Holley, Mark Holton, and Terry Hutchens.

Chancellors participating were Karrie Dixon and Sharon Gaber.

Staff members present included Jennifer Haygood, Brandy Andrews, Katherine Lynn, Aubrey Clark-Brown, and others from the University of North Carolina System Office.

Committee Faculty Assembly advisors present included Jim Westerman.

1. Call to Order and Approval of OPEN Session Minutes (Item A-1)

The chair called the meeting to order at 10:19 a.m. on Wednesday, May 22, 2024. The open session minutes of the regular the Committee on Budget and Finance and the joint Committee on Budget and Finance and Committee on Military and Public Affairs from the Wednesday, April 17, 2024, meetings were approved by unanimous consent.

2. Update on Student Health Insurance (Item A-2)

Executive Vice President Andrew Kelly and Ms. Mona Moon gave the committee an informational update on the renewal negotiations of Student Blue for next year and potential student health insurance transitions in future years.

This item was for discussion only.

3. FY 2025 All-Funds Budget (Item A-3)

Chair Clark called on Senior Vice President Jennifer Haygood to give the committee a presentation summarizing the University of North Carolina institutions' FY 2024-25 All-Funds Budgets. Ms. Haygood highlighted common themes reflected in the institutional highlights and executive summary.

This item was for information only.

4. FY 2023 UNC System Debt Capacity Study (Item A-4)

Chair Clark called on Ms. Haygood to review the FY 2023 UNC System Debt Capacity Study. Fifteen institutions maintained or increased their debt capacity over the five-year study period, nine institutions increased their debt capacity compared to last year, and all 16 institutions maintained or improved at least one of their primary financial ratios since the 2022 study. The chair asked for a motion to approve the Study.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the FY 2023 UNC System Debt Capacity Study and recommend it to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

5. Revision to Sale of Special Obligation Bonds — NC State University (Item A-5)

The chair called on Ms. Haygood to explain NC State University's request for a revision to the sale of special obligation bonds originally approved on April 18, 2024, to issue the bonds on a tax-exempt basis. The chair asked for a motion to approve the revision.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the revision for the sale of special obligation bonds forNC State University and recommend it to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

6. Amendments to Use and Management Agreements – University of North Carolina at Pembroke (Item A-6)

The chair called on Ms. Haygood to present the University of North Carolina at Pembroke's request for authorization of amendments to a previously approved use agreement and management agreement, both related to the financing of the University Courtyard Apartments student housing facilities. Courtyard's two-phase construction was financed through the UNCP University Foundation, LLC. The chair asked for a motion to approve the amendments to use and management agreements.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the amendments to use and management agreements for UNC Pembroke and recommend them to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

Motion: Reginald Holley Motion carried

7. Amendment to Use Agreement – Winston-Salem State University (Item A-7)

The chair called on Ms. Haygood to present Winston-Salem State University's request for authorization of amendments to a previously approved use agreement related to the financing of approximately 848 beds across two student housing facilities that were financed through the Winston-Salem State University Housing Foundation, LLC. The chair asked for a motion to approve the amendments to use agreement.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the amendments to use agreement for WSSU and recommend them to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

Motion: Reginald Holley Motion carried

8. Capital Improvement Projects (Item A-8)

The chair called on Vice President Katherine Lynn to present the requests for the authorization of \$3.65 million for two new capital projects at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and Western Carolina University and \$5.75 million for four increased authorizations at Fayetteville State University, UNC Greensboro, and WCU; and the reporting of one chancellor's R&R project less than \$600,000 in compliance with statute. The chair asked for a motion to approve the capital improvement projects authorizations.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the capital improvement projects and recommend them to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

Motion: Reginald Holley Motion carried

9. Approval of the Selection of the Design-Build Firm – PBS North Carolina (Item A-9)

The chair called on Ms. Lynn to present PBS North Carolina's selection of LeChase Construction Services, LLC, as the design-build firm for the Emergency Power Systems Upgrades project.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on Budget and Finance approve the selection of the design-build firm for PBS North Carolina and recommend it to the full Board of Governors for a vote through the consent agenda.

10. Adjourn (Item A-10)

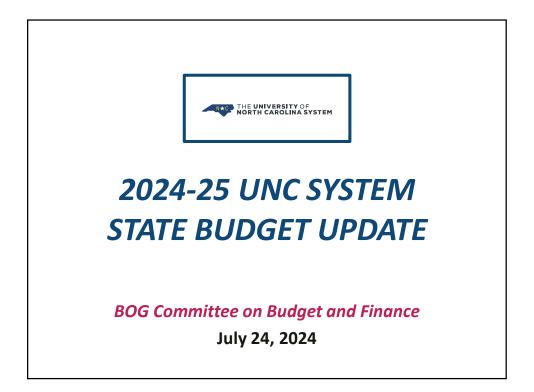


AGENDA ITEM

A-2. State Budget UpdateJennifer Haygood

- Situation: One of the principal responsibilities of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors is to "develop, prepare, and present to the Governor and the General Assembly a single, unified recommended budget for the constituent institutions of the University of North Carolina" [G.S. 116-11(9)a]. In odd-numbered years, the General Assembly enacts a biennial (two-year) budget. In even-numbered years, adjustments are made to the budget for the second fiscal year of the biennium.
- **Background:** During the legislature's current short session, the North Carolina General Assembly will make adjustments to the budget passed last year for the FY 2023-25 biennium. The adjustments will be for the 2024-25 fiscal year. The House and Senate have each passed a version of the budget adjustments. Legislators will attempt to reconcile the differences between the two proposals in the conference process later this year. If an agreement is not reached, then the biennial budget as passed last year will remain in effect.
- Assessment: The Board of Governors' approved budget priorities that were submitted to both the Governor and the General Assembly. Our Systemwide priorities focus on critical core operations such as funding for enrollment change, building reserves, and completion assistance programs. The House and Senate budgets included some but not all the Board's priorities. The University of North Carolina System Office will continue to advocate for the inclusion of all Board priorities throughout the budget process.

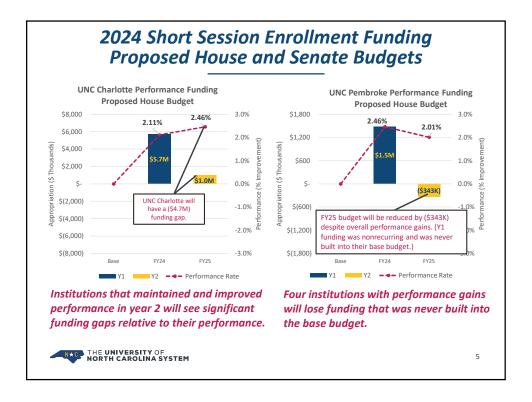

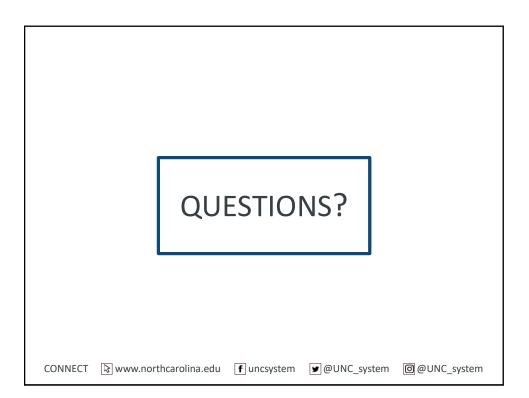

A-3. FY 2024-25 Enrollment Change Budget AdjustmentsJennifer Haygood

- Situation: To date, the North Carolina General Assembly has not enacted legislation to further revise the FY 2024-25 State budget. Based on Resolution 2024-2, it is likely the General Assembly will not consider further action on the State budget until they reconvene on November 19, 2024. Given this anticipated timeline, the UNC System needs to proceed with implementing the FY 2024-25 State budget as enacted by S.L. 2023-134.
- Background: The UNC System funding model adjusts each institution's General Fund appropriation based on two factors: (1) resident enrollment and (2) institutional performance. Based on this model, the FY 2024-25 budget priorities approved by the University of North Carolina Board of Governors in April included a request for \$46.5 million in recurring General Fund appropriations. Of this amount, \$574,578 was based on the <u>net</u> change in resident student credit hours delivered. Both the House and Senate versions of the Short Session budget propose funding \$574,578 to support our system's net enrollment change.

Although the net amount associated with enrollment change seems small, it includes increases of \$20.1 million at eight institutions with resident enrollment growth and decreases of \$19.5 million at nine institutions with resident enrollment declines. Therefore, approximately 97 percent of the budget adjustments associated with enrollment changes can be effectuated under the Board's existing statutory authority. Per G.S. 116-11(9)(c), "The Director of the Budget may, on recommendation of the Board, authorize transfer of appropriated funds from one institution to another to provide adjustments for over or under enrollment or may make any other adjustments among institutions that would provide for the orderly and efficient operation of the institutions."

Assessment: Since no further revisions to the State budget are expected in the near future, and delaying all enrollment-related budget adjustments poses financial management risks, the Board of Governors should (1) use its statutory authority to adjust budgets for enrollment changes as proposed in the table in the attached materials and (2) approve the allocation of the additional amounts <u>contingent</u> on legislation being enacted to appropriate the additional \$574,578 needed.

Action: This item requires a vote by the committee and a vote by the full Board of Governors.

FY 2024-25 Enrollment Change Budget Adjustments

University of North Carolina System Enrollment Funding Formula

The enrollment change budget adjustment is calculated based on the incremental change in student credit hours (SCHs) from one calendar year to the next. Funding is received during the fiscal year that immediately follows the period of change. The model adjusts funding to reflect changes in **actual resident student credit hours** delivered from calendar year 2022 to 2023. Systemwide, resident student credit hours decreased by one percent from calendar year 2022 to 2023. However, the enrollment appropriation request increased slightly due to how the model funds different credit hours. Since the model categorizes resident student credit hours based on the area of instruction, the slight decrease in total resident student credit hours was offset by students taking more credit hours in disciplines with higher funding rates such as STEM fields.

2023 Enrollment Change

To date, the North Carolina General Assembly has not enacted legislation to further revise the FY 2024-25 State budget. Based on Resolution 2024-2, it is likely the General Assembly will not consider further action on the State budget until they reconvene on November 19, 2024. Given this anticipated timeline, the UNC System needs to proceed with implementing the FY 2024-25 State budget as enacted by S.L. 2023-134.

Based on the model described above, eight institutions produced increased resident student credit hours for an increased enrollment subsidy of \$20.1 million and nine institutions produced decreased resident student credit hours for a decreased subsidy of \$19.5 million creating a net change in resident student credit hours of \$574,578. Therefore, approximately 97 percent of the budget adjustments associated with enrollment changes can be effectuated under the University of North Carolina Board of Governors' existing statutory authority. Per G.S. 116-11(9)(c):

"The Director of the Budget may, on recommendation of the Board, authorize transfer of appropriated funds from one institution to another to provide adjustments for over or under enrollment or may make any other adjustments among institutions that would provide for the orderly and efficient operation of the institutions."

Table 1 below breaks down the enrollment changes by institution. For the eight institutions with a positive change, the budget adjustment increase is prorated to 97 percent of the full amount with the remainder contingent upon passage of legislation appropriating the additional \$574,578.

It is further recommended that these projects be reported to the North Carolina Office of State Budget and Management as non-appropriated projects that do not require any additional debt or burden on state appropriations.
Action:	This item requires a vote by the committee, with a vote by the full Board of Governors through the consent agenda.

Capital Improvement Projects – Appalachian State University, East Carolina University, NC State University, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, University of North Carolina Wilmington, Western Carolina University, and PBS North Carolina

ISSUE OVERVIEW

University of North Carolina System institutions are required to request authority from the University of North Carolina Board of Governors to proceed with non-appropriated projects using available funds (non-general funds). Non-appropriated capital projects are funded by the institution and include the construction, repair, or renovation of facilities such as residence halls, dining facilities, research buildings, athletic facilities, and student health buildings.

Seven UNC System institutions have requested 12 capital improvement projects: five new projects and seven projects for increased authorization.

- Situation: NC State University Board of Trustees requests authorization for disposition of property by lease of approximately 40 acres on the Centennial Campus, Hillsborough Street, Raleigh, North Carolina.
- **Background:** NC State currently leases to the NCSU Foundation, Inc., the 40 acres that is the subject of this request. The land is subleased to the NC State University Club (UClub), which operates a recreational club. The new lease will be to CBC Land I, LLC, superseding the lease to the NCSU Foundation, Inc. ISSUE OVERVIEW

The University of the North Carolina System institutions are required to request authority from the University of North Carolina Board of Governors to proceed with certain acquisitions and dispositions of real property. The NC State University Board of Trustees requests authorization for the disposition of property by lease of 40 acres on the Centennial Campus, Hillsborough Street, Raleigh, North Carolina.

NC State currently ground leases to the NCSU Foundation, Inc., the 40 acres that is the subject of this request. The land is subleased to the NC State University Club (UClub), an associated entity of NC State that operates a recreational club with membership of various classes serving NC State faculty, staff, alumni, and others. The new lease will be to CBC Land I, LLC, also an associated entity of NC State that manages real property for this portion of the Centennial Campus. This proposed lease supersedes the lease to the NCSU Foundation, Inc. CBC Land I, LLC, will in turn sublease the land to the UClub. The term of the proposed lease is 99 years for nominal consideration.

The superseding lease disposal moves between NC State-associated entities the responsibility to sublease to the UClub and brings the operation of similar arrangements with increased oversight and structure for real estate business operations.

The NC State Board of Trustees approved the disposition by lease on April 26, 2024.

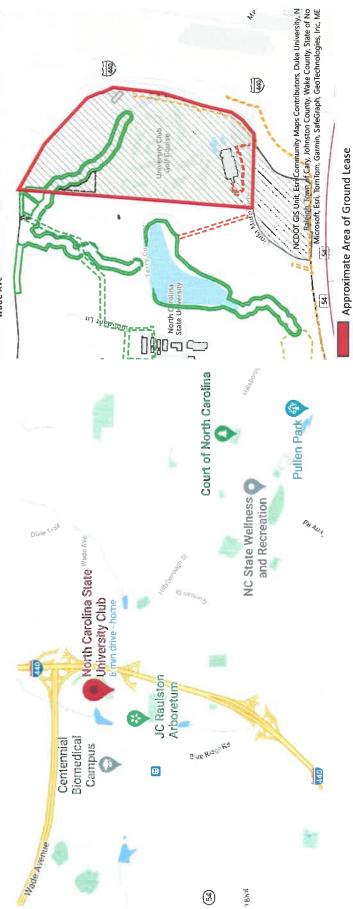

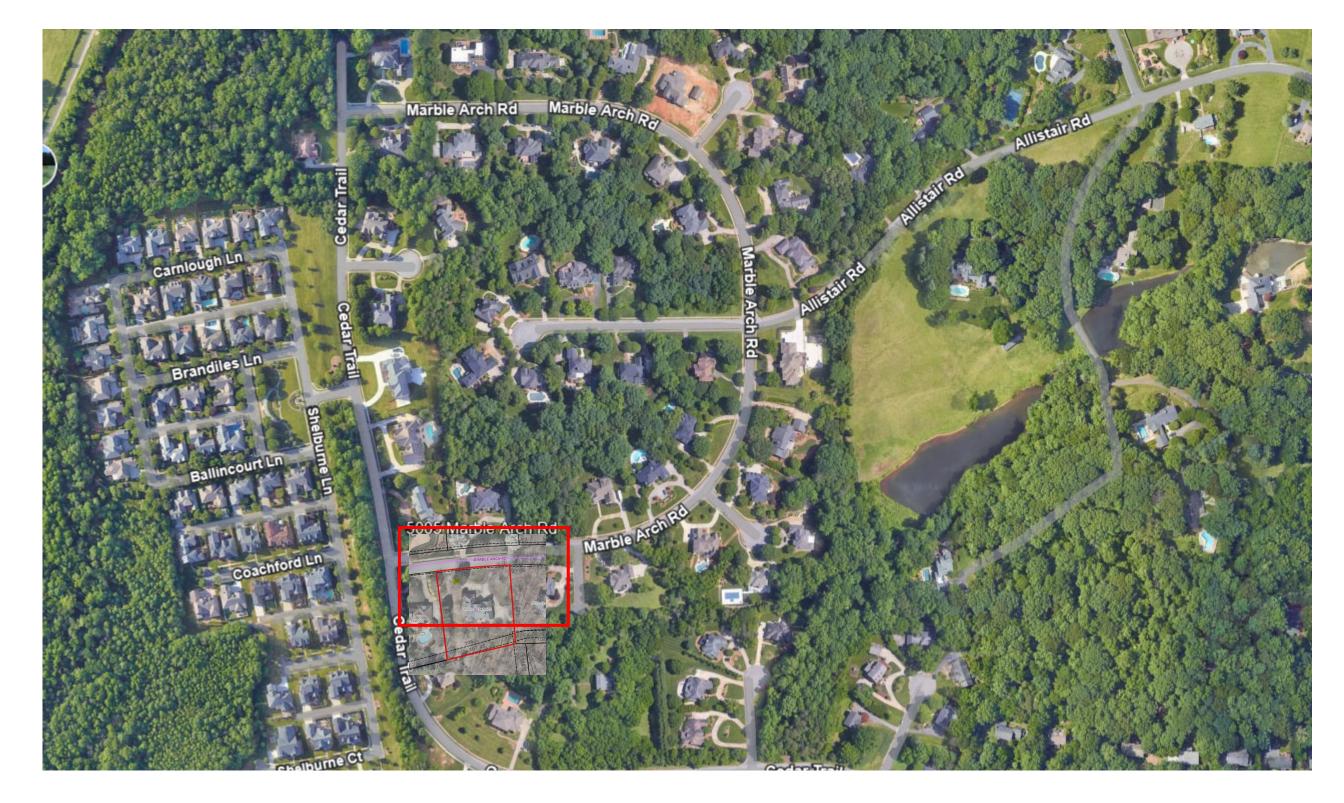

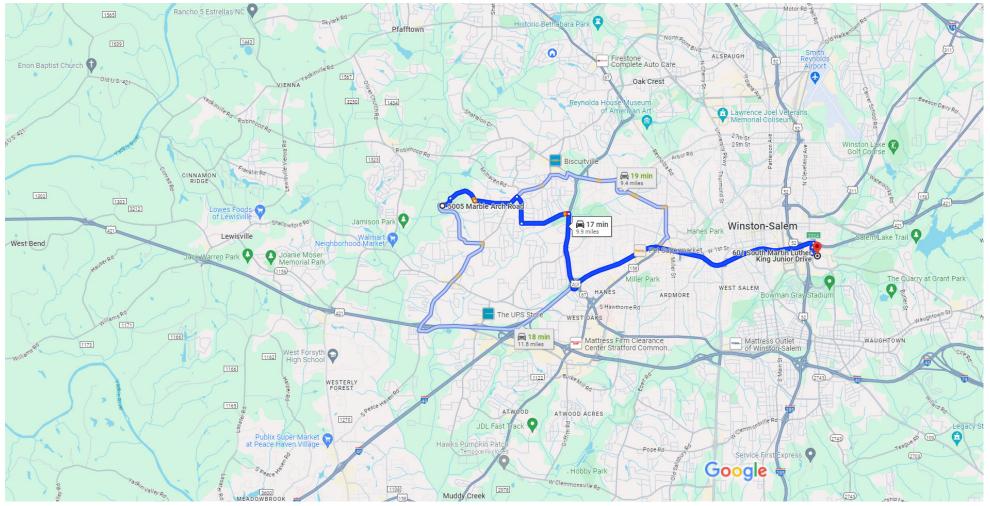
