This meeting of the Committee on University Governance was presided over by Chair Alex Mitchell. The following committee members, constituting a quorum, were present by videoconference or phone: Pearl Burris-Floyd, C. Philip Byers, Joel Ford, Randy Ramsey, and Michael Williford.

Also participating were Chancellor Karrie Dixon and Chancellor Todd Roberts. Chancellor Brian Cole was absent.

Staff members present included Andrew Tripp, Meredith McCullen, and others from the UNC System Office.

1. Call to Order and Approval of OPEN Session Minutes (Item A-1)

The chair called the meeting to order at 11:30 a.m. on Wednesday July 24, 2024. The open session minutes from the May 16, and May 22, 2024, meetings were approved by unanimous consent.

2. North Carolina Teaching Fellows Commission Appointments (Item A-2)

Chair Mitchell reviewed seven nominees for the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Commission. After reviewing the nominees with the committee, Chair Mitchell asked for a motion to approve the nominees.

MOTION: Resolved, that the Committee on University Governance approve the reappointment of Patrick Brennan, Taleek Harlee, Debora Powell, Matthew Price, and Joy Smith, and the appointment of Malcolm Butler and Amanda Lee to the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Commission for terms that began July 1, 2024, and end June 30, 2026, and send to the full Board of Governors for a vote.

3. 2024-25 UNC System Board of Trustees Appointment Process (Item A-3)

DUTIES AND MEMBERSHIP

The Committee on University Governance is responsible for reviewing and making recommendations for proposed changes to the UNC Policy Manual, including *The Code*, and the delegations of duty and authority involving University governance; for nominating individuals for election to the 17 institutional boards of trustees and other University-related boards; and for authorizing the initiation and settlement of litigation and pending litigation in circumstances where that authority has not otherwise been delegated. This report summarizes the work of the committee from July 2023 through June 2024.

The committee was composed of the following Board members: Kellie Hunt Blue, J. Alexander Mitchell, Michael Williford, C. Philip Byers, and Pearl Burris Floyd. Mrs. Blue served as chair, Mr. Mitchell served as vice chair, and Mr. Williford served as secretary.

Dr. Wesley Burks (UNC Health), Chancellor Darrell Allison (Fayetteville State University), and Chancellor Harold Martin (North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University) also served on the committee.

ACTIONS

Between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024, the Committee on University Governance met in seven regularly scheduled meetings and one special meeting. The major actions of the committee are summarized as follows:

Review of The Code, UNC Policy Manual (Policies, Regulations, and Guidelines)

The committee is responsible for reviewing and making recommendations for proposed changes to *The Code* and UNC Policy Manual, and the delegations of duty and authority involving University governance. During the 2023-24 period, the following policy items were considered or reviewed by the committee:

1. UNC Policy Manual

a. **Amendments to Section 1100.1** Section 1100.1, *Policy on Intercollegiate Athletics*, details the Board of Governors delegated responsibility for intercollegiate athletics to the chancellors under *The Code's Delegation of Duty and Authority*. The revisions to the policy are designed to enhance oversight of the intercollegiate athletics program by requiring the chancellors to make available certain athletic related agreements to the Board of Governors and provide the president notice of, and a financial plan for, any agreement that would result in the constituent institution transferring, leaving, or joining an athletic conference association. The purpose of this notice is to provide the president the opportunity to weigh in on the potential impacts of the agreement, including those that may impact the financial health of the intercollegiate athletics program, contract risks, and/or legal risks associated with the agreement. Further, the revisions provide the Board of Governors an opportunity to review the agreement and financial plan and potentially weigh in with legal counsel such that it can inform the constituent institution of any legal risks that might flow from the agreement.

- b. **Amendments to Section 200.1** Section 200.1, *Dual Memberships and Conflicts of Interest*, details the Board of Governor's policy on dual memberships and conflicts of interest. The revisions to the policy reflect statutory updates as it relates to dual memberships and conflicts of interest for Board members.
- c. **Amendments to Section 200.5** Section 200.5, *Policy on Legal Affairs; Initiating and Settling Potential and Pending Litigation*, governs legal affairs and the initiation and settlement of litigation within the University of North Carolina. The amendments to this policy define reporting requirements to the Committee on University Governance and Board of Governors as it relates to initiating and settling litigation.
- d. **Amendments to Section 200.6** Section 200.6, *Policy on Delegation of Authority to the President*, defines what authorities are delegated by the Board of Governors to the president of the University of North Carolina System. The amendments clarify delegations of authority as it relates to initiating and settling potential and pending litigation, as well as delegation for campus safety and security.
- e. **Amendments to Section 300.8.5** Section 300.8.5, *Equality Within the University of North Carolina*, defines the University of North Carolina's longstanding commitment to the equality of opportunity in education and employment as a core value. The Board voted to repeal and supersede the previous version of 300.8.5. The new policy ensures that diverse persons of any background, from North Carolina and beyond, are invited, included, and treated equally. The replacement further aligns UNC Policy with recent statutory enactments and current jurisprudence.

2. Technical Correction to the UNC Policy Manual

Section 100.2 VI.D. of the UNC Policy Manual authorizes the secretary of the University, in consultation with the senior vice president and general counsel, to make technical changes to the UNC Policy Manual. Technical changes are defined as including:

- Correction of typographical errors;
- Updates to names, titles, statutory, and regulatory references, and other designations;

- Correction of inconsistencies among policies that may result due to a more recent policy adoption, amendment, or rescission;
- Assurance that board delegations and resolutions are accurately reflected throughout *The Code* and the UNC Policy Manual; and
- Annotation of policies, regulations, and guidelines to cross-reference other provisions of the UNC Policy Manual.

Pursuant to this policy, which requires technical corrections to be summarized and reported in writing to the chair of the Board of Governors and the Committee on University Governance, Attachment A of this report provides all the technical corrections that were completed during the 2023-24 year.

Department of Defense Classified Research

The committee passed a resolution on Clearance Requirements, which is an annual requirement related to Department of Defense contracts. The Department of Defense requires the UNC System to maintain Facility Security Clearance. Department of Defense regulations permit the exclusion from the personnel clearance requirements of certain members of the Board and other officers, provided that this action is recorded in the corporate minutes. This resolution was included on the Thursday, September 21, 2023, consent agenda.

Litigation Requests/Settlements

The committee considered and approved a range of requests to settle and initiate legal matters and heard updates on pending disputes from its counsel.

Free Speech and Free Expression

G.S. 116-301 requires that the Board designate a standing committee to act as the Committee on Free Expression and report annually to the public, the Board, the Governor, and the General Assembly on issues related to free speech and free expression within the University. The Board has designated the Committee on University Governance to fulfill these responsibilities. As part of its duties, the committee received the annual report and hosted two presentations surrounding free speech and free expression.

- 1. **Annual Report.** As required by state law and Section 1300.8 of the UNC Policy Manual, *Policy on Free Speech and Free Expression Within the University of North Carolina System*, the Committee on University Governance is responsible for preparing an annual report on free speech and free expression within the University that addresses at least the following topics:
 - Any barriers to or disruptions of free expression within the University's constituent institutions;
 - The administrative handling and discipline relating to disruptions or barriers to free expression;
 - Any substantial difficulties, controversies, or successes in meeting the requirements of maintaining institutional neutrality as provided in the law and Section 1300.8 of the UNC Policy Manual; and
 - Any assessments, criticisms, commendations, or recommendations the committee sees fit to include.

This report addresses free speech and free expression at the constituent institutions for the period of time between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023. The report finds that constituent institutions are committed to promoting and protecting free speech and free expression, and that disruptions and interference at scheduled speaking or expressive events have been minimal over the past year. The report details steps that constituent institutions are taking to inform campus constituencies about rights and responsibilities, as well as recommendations for improving free expression across the University.

Resolution Honoring Law Enforcement

The committee approved a resolution to send to the full Board praising law enforcement who have served, and continue to protect, our University's campuses. The resolution offers special thanks to the law enforcement officers who willingly and courageously answered the call to protect our University. The resolution stated, "The Board of Governors offers its special thanks to the men and women of the University of North Carolina police departments across the state who have faced campus protests and led the nation in modeling best practices on how to preserve the freedoms of speech and assembly while keeping our students safe."

Back	ground:	The Department of Defense requires the UNC System to maintain a Facility Security Clearance in the performance of classified contracts. In connection with this Facility Clearance, certain senior management officials must obtain an individual security clearance. This resolution is required to exempt members of the Board of Governors and senior officers of the UNC System from the requirement to obtain individual security clearances.	
Asse	ssment:	This is an annual resolution to be adopted by the Board of Governors.	
Actio	on:	This item requires a vote by the committee, with a vote by the full Board of Governors through the consent agenda.	



RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA AUTHORIZING SECURITY CLEARANCE

WHEREAS, current Department of Defense Regulations contain a provision making it mandatory that the chair of the Board and principal officers meet the personnel clearance requirements established for a contractor's facility clearance; and

WHEREAS, said Department of Defense Regulations permit the exclusion from the personnel clearance requirements of certain members of the Board of Governors and other officers, provided that this action is recorded in the corporate minutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT DECLARED that the chair of the Board, the president of the University of North Carolina, Insider Threat Program Senior Official, and the University's Facility Security Officer at the present time do possess, or will be processed for, the required security clearance; and

BE IT RESOLVED that in the future, when any individual enters upon any duties as chair of the Board, the president of the University of North Carolina, Insider Threat Program Senior Official, or as the University's Facility Security Officer, such individual shall immediately make application for the required security clearance; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following members of the Board of Governors and other officers shall not require, shall not have, and can be effectively excluded from access to **CLASSIFIED** information in the possession of the corporation and do not occupy positions that would enable them to affect adversely corporate policies or practices in the performance of classified contracts for the Department of Defense or the User Agencies of its Industrial Security Program.

Susan Strum

Susan Strum, a native of Franklin, North Carolina, received degrees in biology (BS) and chemistry (BA) from Western Carolina University in 1987. While a student, Strum was president of the Biology Club and recipient of the Don L. Yopp Merit Award and a Sigma Xi Research Award. Strum recently served as chair of the WCU College of Arts and Sciences Advancement Council from 2015 to 2019. Strum began her career in academic research then as a biochemist conducting pharmaceutical research, earning multiple awards for excellence. She is currently head of assay development at Sapere Bio Inc. in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina. She brought her industry experience and expertise to design, develop, and implement an innovative diagnostic product that measures molecular age in individuals with the purpose to improve their aging through intervention. Strum and her husband, Jay, also a WCU alumnus, have established an endowed scholarship in the WCU College of Arts and Sciences for students from the western North Carolina region who need financial assistance to achieve their educational goals. The Strums also sponsor a classroom in the new Apodaca Science Building in support of the Biology Department educational programs.

The report finds that (1) the constituent institutions remain committed to promoting and protecting free speech and free expression; (2) disruptions and interference at scheduled speaking or expressive events have been minimal over the past year; and (3) the constituent institutions continue to work to provide information to various campus constituencies about rights and responsibilities associated with speech and expression on campus through policies, training, and other outreach; (4) the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression (FIRE), which rates college and university speech policies, has awarded its highest rating ("green light") to 15 of 16 UNC System constituent higher education institutions; and (5) no constituent institutions have reported incurring meaningful additional costs related to security surrounding speakers or expressive events on campus, likely due to the use of virtual platforms.

I. Executive Summary

This report addresses free speech and free expression at the constituent institutions¹ of the University of North Carolina System ("UNC System" or "the University") for the period of time between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024, as required by the <u>Restore/Preserve Campus Free Speech Act</u> ("the Act").² In preparing and publishing this report, the University of North Carolina Board of Governors Committee on University Governance ("committee"), as the designated Committee on Free Expression,³ was guided primarily by the elements required by the Act.⁴

With the requirements of the Act in mind, this report provides background on and context for free speech and free expression at UNC System constituent institutions. The report is effectively a "well visit."

Specifically, as will be further detailed in this report, the committee found that:

- 1. The constituent institutions remain committed to promoting and protecting free speech and free expression;
- 2. Disruptions and interference at scheduled expressive events have been minimal;
- 3. Constituent institutions have developed and utilized mechanisms for receiving, investigating, and resolving complaints regarding alleged free expression policy violations;
- The constituent institutions are regularly providing information to campus constituencies about rights and responsibilities associated with expression on campus through policies, training, and other outreach;
- 5. The Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression (FIRE), which rates college and university speech policies, has awarded its highest rating to 15 UNC System constituent institutions.
- 6. No reporting constituent institutions have incurred undue financial costs related to security surrounding speakers or expressive events on campus; and
- 7. Constituent institutions continue to accept the recommendations for improvement contained in last year's report.

In addition to work happening on each individual campus, the University's collection of Responsible Officers, which are designated to ensure compliance with <u>Section 1300.8</u> of the UNC Policy Manual, *Policy on Free Speech and Free Expression Within the University of North Carolina System*, have also engaged cooperatively to create and improve resources regarding free expression within the University System. The UNC System Office continues to maintain and update a webpage dedicated to providing information and resources related to free speech and free expression within the University.

Finally, it is important to note that the Board of Governors recently adopted Section 300.8.5 of the UNC Policy Manual, *Equality Within the University of North Carolina*, and its implementation is ongoing.

II. Background

A. University Commitment to Free Speech and Free Expression

As the nation's first public university, the University of North Carolina System affirms its long- standing commitment to free speech and free expression for its students, faculty members, staff employees, and visitors under the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and Article 1, Section 14, of the North Carolina Constitution. The University and its constituent institutions protect and promote these freedoms, consistent with First Amendment jurisprudence.⁵ Through its policies, the University has expressly established that no employment decision or academic decision shall be based on the exercise of these constitutional rights.⁶

B. Restore/Preserve Campus Free Speech Act

Through statute, the North Carolina General Assembly has affirmed that the primary function of the University of North Carolina System and each of its constituent institutions is the discovery, improvement, transmission, and dissemination of knowledge by means of research, teaching, discussion, and debate. To fulfill this function, each constituent institution must strive to ensure the fullest degree of intellectual freedom and

free expression. According to G.S. 116-300(2), "it is not the proper role of any constituent institution to shield individuals from speech protected by the First Amendment, including, without limitation, ideas and opinions they find unwelcome, disagreeable, or even deeply offensive."⁷

The General Assembly has also established several requirements for the Board of Governors, the University of North Carolina System, and its constituent institutions regarding free expression. In response, the Board of Governors has designated a Committee on Free Expression and adopted a University-wide free expression policy which, among other elements, maintains institutional neutrality. A copy of the policy is linked <u>here</u>. Additionally, the University meets its statutory obligations by providing training for institutional officers and administrators charged with responsibilities for compliance with the Act and coordinating campus-based training ("Responsible Officers") and publishing this annual report. III. Discussion of Free Speech and Free Expression at the University During the 2023-24 Academic Year and Committee Findings

Pursuant to the Act, the University's policy, and the Board's interest in a broad review of free expression across the University, the committee received information from responding constituent institutions in nine areas. The questions and summaries of the institutional responses are provided below.

In the case of UNC-Chapel Hill and UNC Charlotte, student behavior on campuses in the vein of disruption resulted in student conduct proceedings and in some instances criminal arrest and prosecutions.
(3) Identification and description of any difficulties, controversies, and successes in maintaining a posture of administrative and institutional neutrality about political or social issues. ¹⁰	 The responding institutions reported consistently that the work of free expression went on. The responding institutions consistently reported steady and regular efforts to foster a culture of free expression. UNC Asheville experienced many successes in maintaining a posture of institutional neutrality. In December 2023, UNC Asheville invited Will Creeley of the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression to present to the university's senior staff. Mr. Creeley's presentations discussed the principles and importance of free expression in higher education. Institutions reported success in maintaining institutional neutrality regarding the ongoing conflict in Israel and Gaza.

One campus recommended additional training to ensure Free Speech Responsible Officers are able to maintain their credibility as a resource on campus. UNC Asheville raised a thoughtful question about how to reconcile the commitment to institutional neutrality with a recent "Dear Colleague" letter from the Department of Education regarding a university's communication of opposition to stereotypical, derogatory opinions. All responding institutions indicated that they had disseminated information as required by policy.

Most notably, the Board of Governors adopted Section 300.5.8 of the UNC Policy Manual which restates in one place the myriad laws and policies affirming equality, nondiscrimination, and institutional neutrality within the University. Finally, UNC-Chapel Hill recently updated its student conduct policies in a meaningful way ensuring even more timely, fair adjudication of conduct proceedings on that campus.

As a result of the information gathered, it appears again this year that (1) the constituent institutions remain committed to promoting and protecting free speech and free expression; (2) disruptions and interference at scheduled speaking or expressive events have been minimal over the past year; and (3) the constituent institutions continue to work to provide information to various campus constituencies about rights and responsibilities associated with speech and expression on campus

through policies, training, and other outreach; (4) the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression (FIRE), which rates college and university speech policies, has awarded its highest rating ("green light") to 15 of 16 UNC System constituent higher education institutions; and (5) no constituent institutions have reported incurring meaningful additional costs related to security surrounding speakers or expressive events on campus, likely due to the use of virtual platforms.

IV. Implementation of Past Report Recommendations

Constituent institutions reported a variety of processes and resources that have been introduced or improved to implement recommendations from the committee's 2022-23 free expression annual report.

V. New Initiatives & Committee Recommendations for 2023-24

The committee recognizes that there are always opportunities for improving the University's commitment to free speech and free expression.

This annual report provides a welcome opportunity to consider options that will demonstrate our Systemwide leadership and action in support of free speech and free expression. The committee therefore offers these recommendations for consideration for implementation by the UNC System Office:

- 1. Continue to foster opportunities for free speech and free expression among campus communities that are geographically disconnected due to social distancing guidelines.
- 2. Continue to adapt traditional free expression expectations within increased virtual instruction and online interaction.
- 3. Continue to provide training to constituent institution administrators who have transitioned into the Responsible Officer title.
- 4. Continue to foster a culture of conversation among all stakeholders about the importance of free expression. High repetition of low intensity reminders pays dividends in the way that all campus stakeholders consider the importance of free expression in their daily lives.
- 5. Seek universal "green" status across the UNC System from FIRE.
- 6. Monitor implementation of the Compelled Speech Policy and the Equality Policy and answer to the best of our ability specific, concrete questions as they arise in consultation with the Division of Legal Affairs.

V. Conclusion

The committee continues to support the UNC System Office's and the constituent institutions' work and efforts in promoting and protecting free speech and free expression, increasing awareness and understanding of the broad protections for speech and expressive activities on campus, and taking action, when needed, to prevent substantial disruption or interference in scheduled events.

The annual obligations that produce this report effect a culture of periodic "well visits" checking into the health of free expression on our campuses. This report confirms that the transparency and accountability required by the originating legislation are having their desired effect, and the content of this report remains consistent generally year over year. The reporting and survey responses document that the importance of free expression is at the fore of our responding institutions' minds and creating neutral forums in which diverse thought is fostered has become a habit at our universities and within the committee itself.

Examples of Free Speech Events Held on Campuses

1. **Winston-Salem State University**. A survey of WSSU's scheduling and space reservation platform (25 Live) was conducted to identify instances of speakers and lectures on campus. Approximately 27 events were found. Additionally, a search of the RAMSync database for student-led events was conducted to identify speaker events. Twenty-six (26) events were identified with topics ranging from Bible studies or the importance of the black vote in American history to a forum with Liz Cheney at Wake Forest University.

2. **Appalachian State University**. Constitution Week Events, which included a bipartisan panel of local leaders to a discussion called "Our Constitution and the Call for Public Service" on September 18, 2023. We attended a local Temple service to discuss campus resources and opportunities around free speech.

3. **East Carolina University**. ECU continued to host its "Cupola Conversations" discussion series and held regular events and invited speakers throughout the 2023-24 academic year.

4. **UNC-Chapel Hill**. Aside from the events described above where there were disruptions to campus, many peaceful protests and speaker events occurred. The following list is a sampling. September 21, 2023, students held a peaceful protest sit-in on the steps of Wilson Library to advocate for a Palestinian flag to fly at Kenan Flagler Business School, among the other flags. October 4, 2023, the Hussman School of Journalism and Media co-hosted a panel with the FIRE on legal challenges faced by media professionals. Two protests occurred October 12, 2023. Students for Justice in Palestine held a rally, which attracted a counterprotest of pro-Israel individuals. UNC-Chapel Hill Police supervised the event, which remained peaceful. Students gathered outside the Carolina Inn to protest an event inside hosting speakers from Starbucks. Protesters did not enter the building and disrupt the event. October 17, 2023, Kristan Hawkins, president of Students for Life of America, spoke inside the Carolina Union, while other student groups held a pro-choice party in the Pit. October 26, 2023, Dr. Ben Carson spoke at UNC-Chapel Hill. January 30, 2024, Cornel West spoke in a panel along with UNC-Chapel Hill faculty. February 7, 2024, Jonathan Haidt spoke on social media and free speech. February 23, students hosted speaker Imam Wisam Sharieff. March 6 Turning Point USA hosted Candace Owens. NASA astronaut and alumna Zena Cardman was the keynote speaker for the 2024 Commencement. April 12, 2024, students peacefully marched on South Building to demand that a suspended law student be permitted to attend graduation.

5. **UNC Asheville**. UNC Asheville hosted a variety of expressive activities in 2023-24. These included student organization events, spontaneous demonstrations, University-sponsored events, and use of university space by public users.

6. **UNC Wilmington**. UNCW experienced three peaceful student protests this year that did not cause any incidents or disruptions to the campus. These included a spring 2024 demonstration of around 50 students marching in support of DEI resources and a group of fewer than five students who convened in the university amphitheater by Fisher Student Union to talk about the conflict Gaza. Another group of around 20 students convened at the dining hall to support peace in the Gaza area by doing artwork. Again, there were no incidents or disruptions associated with these examples of expression by our students. Only the larger event required, and was, registered in advance of the convening. There were no additional security costs. Freedom of Expression/Constitution Day Event "F.O.E.-

on-the-Go" Freedom of Expression event, Wednesday, Sep 20, 2023, featuring 10 didactic posters depicting pivotal free-speech cases in U.S. history; an interactive activity inviting input on participants' attitudes about free expression; a First Amendment quiz; and distribution of free pocket copies of the U.S. Constitution. Leadership Lecture Series Tuesday, October 17, 2023. Leadership Lecture Series featuring Tara Schuster, former vice president of Talent and Development at Comedy Central. Monday, November 6, 2023.
