Excerpts from Remarks by Mary K. Grant Chancellor-Elect, University of North Carolina at Asheville UNC Board of Governors Meeting August 1, 2014

Kennedy (another Massachusean), 'Let us think of education as the means of developing our greatest abilities, because in each of us there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefit for everyone and greater strength for our nation.'
